## A Message on "Ordinary Time" from the Rector

After the season of Pentecost, we enter into what we call *Ordinary Time* on the church calendar. The word "ordinary" does not mean common or mundane. Instead, it is from the word "ordinal" which means "counted." We count the Sundays after Pentecost because it is a long stretch of time that spans several months, beginning after Easter on Trinity Sunday, and concluding with the Feast of Christ the King in the late fall, just before Advent. You will notice that our liturgical colors are green, as evident in the beautiful altar hangings as well as the vestments worn by the clergy. Green represents the new beginnings of the church after Pentecost and also the promise of new life in the Resurrection. In following our readings for each Sunday in Ordinary Time, you will discover that it is anything but ordinary! During this liturgical season, we learn about Jesus' life and ministry through the synoptic (meaning the "same") Gospel stories. This year we focus on the Gospel of Matthew as the story of the early church unfolds, and we are invited to be part of this story as we enter into God's mission in the world.

If you are with us for the first time, please make yourself comfortable. We look forward to meeting you. If you would like to learn more about the church, please fill out a card (hanging in each pew), put it in the offering plate or hand it to an usher or member of the clergy, and we will be in touch. It is our custom to be silent before the service, so as you take some time to pray, please turn off all electronic devices. All you should need to participate in the service is found here, in this bulletin and in the blue hymnal in the pew rack. Hearing assist devices are available. While we do not have a staffed nursery or children's Christian education in the summer months, the nursery room in the Education Wing is open and available should parents wish to take their children there during the service for feeding, changing or other needs. Please ask the ushers for assistance with these or any other requests. Again, welcome.

THE EPISTLE Romans 8: 1-11

Ihere is no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set you free from the law of sin and of death. For God has done what the law, weakened by the flesh, could not do: by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and to deal with sin, he condemned sin in the flesh, so that the just requirement of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not according to the flesh but according to the Spirit. For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit set their minds on the things of the Spirit. To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law-indeed it cannot, and those who are in the flesh cannot please God. But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you.

esus went out of the house and sat beside the sea. Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. And he told them many things in parables, saying: "Listen! A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Let anyone with ears listen! Hear then the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away. But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty."



## Vestry Notes

## A monthly summary of St. John's Vestry meetings

The St. John's Vestry met at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, June 27, 2017 for their regular monthly meeting. Major items of business discussed and voted upon include the following:

- John Roche was elected to complete Wes Winterbottom's unexpired Vestry term (vacated when Wes was elected as Warden in January 2017). John's term goes through January 2018.
- Tim Goetz and Heather Simson were elected as alternate delegates to the annual convention of the Episcopal Church in Connecticut.
- The rector reviewed progress on addressing the three primary areas of focus that were decided on at the spring 2017 Vestry retreat. Those areas are communication, growth, and stewardship. Task forces have been convened for each area, to come up with short-term goals and plans to meet them.
- Music Director Scott Lamlein presented a proposal to create a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization for the Music at the Red Door series, which would allow us to pursue grant funding and other opportunities to continue and grow this successful program. Music at the Red Door supports each of our three core areas (communication, growth, stewardship) by bringing diverse community members through our doors for music events, nurturing children and youth through the youth choir program, and strengthening St. John's public presence as a thriving, welcoming community. After discussion, the proposal was unanimously approved. Scott and some key volunteers will proceed with the legal and administrative tasks required to be incorporated as a nonprofit organization.
- Revised personnel policies were approved. Revisions included clarifying policies on such things as
  alcohol and drug use, conflict of interest, and other areas, to bring them in line with recommendations
  from the Episcopal Church in Connecticut.
- Several youth trips, including the Acolyte Festival in Washington, DC in October 2017; a mission trip to the Dominican Republic in 2018; and choir camp in August 2017, were unanimously approved.
- The Vestry received a book, *Barnabas vs. Paul* by Chuck Robertson, to begin reading over the summer.
   Each month in the 2017-2018 program year, the Vestry will discuss a chapter of the book at their monthly meeting.
- The meeting adjourned at 8:55 p.m. and concluded with a Celtic-style evening worship in the chancel, led by Wes Winterbottom.

The West End Food Pantry could use our help keeping their shelves stocked over the summer, when needs are high and donations are low. Please be generous in bringing non-perishable groceries with you to church any Sunday and place them in the wagon at the back of the church.

The need is ongoing for \$5 or \$10 gift cards to Walgreens, CVS, ShopRite, Dunkin Donuts, or Subway, which we give to people in need who come to the church looking for help. We also give away toiletries (soap, shampoo, conditioner, lotion, toothbrushes, toothpaste, and deodorant), non-perishable snacks (cracker packs, granola bars, etc.), and bus passes (which we purchase in bulk at a discount). Please drop these items at the office during the week or give them to any staff member on Sunday. If you are approached by someone asking for money when you are at St. John's, please refer

them to the rector or suggest that they come to the office during regular office hours. Besides having the above types of non-cash assistance available, we can refer people to other resources.

The 5 p.m. service on summer Sundays in the Cloister Garden ends with an informal coffee hour-style reception, with lemonade or iced tea instead of coffee. **We're signing up volunteers to bring snacks and drinks each week.** Plan for 15-20 people.
