Welcome! We are delighted that you have joined us today - we cherish your attendance.

In order to prepare for worship, our time this afternoon commences with a period of silence which you may enjoy in any way that is meaningful to you: prayer, meditation or simple reflection. We ask that this silence be observed immediately upon entering, and that you turn off all electronic devices.

The value of silence and being present to what is immediate is all too often lost in our busy world. We hope that today's service of presence, contemplation, and periods of quiet provides nourishment and recharging for you. To that end, perhaps you may wish to turn those electronic devices all the way off if you are able!

There are several stations of interest around the church for your perusal or quiet contemplation. You may wish to leave a prayer request for yourself or others at the prayer station, browse the Celtic station icons and information, or light a candle for someone or some purpose. We invite you to visit these spots at any time before, during or after the service.

Your written prayers deposited at the prayer station will be prayed in the coming days by members of the Celtic Worship Guild.

In addition, healing ministers will be available to pray with you, or to offer you a blessing, both as you enter today as well as during the period of extended silence during our worship.

Children are welcome at our worship. To help pass time, please find Celtic themed coloring sheets near the entrances - for children of all ages!

Shortly before our worship commences, a singing bowl tone will mark the end of our silence. Please remain seated while today's musicians lead us in learning the participatory music and chants.



Prayer Stones

As you enter today, you may wish to take a prayer stone as a focus for your prayer.

Spend a few moments quietly resting in God's presence.

Look at your stone: see its color and shape. Feel its texture and its weight.

How does it feel in your hand?

Think about the story of this stone: the rock from which it came, the wind, sun, frost and water that shaped it into its current form.

Think about your own story, and what has led you to today.

Today, we reflect upon the Celtic saints. Who are the saints in your life?

As you hold your stone know that your yesterday, today and tomorrow are held in the palm of God's hand.

If you wish, when you have finished your prayer you may leave your stone behind as a symbol of trusting your life to God's care:

- You may return it to the container with the other stones.
- Alternatively, you may wish to symbolically leave your stone at the base of the Celtic cross.

Finally, please feel free to take your stone home with you and use it again when you pray.

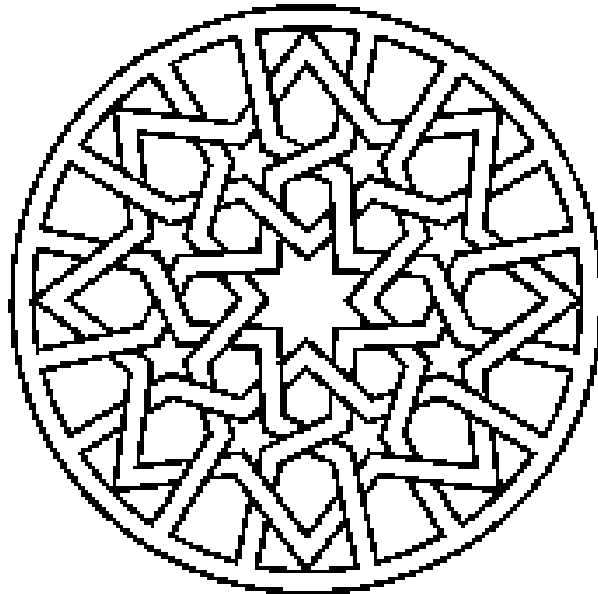
