This week's scripture readings: Living between what is and what will be

The "Long Green Season" is over, the part of the church year when we heard stories of Jesus teaching and healing. Advent has begun, the season of expectation when we wait in joyful hope for the babe in the manger to be born, and we also wait with the pain of knowing that Love will be crucified. The Scriptures appointed for today tell us how to live in the between times, how to keep hoping when life looks bleak, how to keep trusting in God's goodness and presence and care for us. Isaiah tells us that since God's judgment is nigh, we had better start walking in God's ways. Life is too short to spend it in fighting, says the prophet; spend your time instead in reconciliation and peace. Swords shall be beaten into plowshares and spears into pruning hooks; nations shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more. In the second reading, Paul tells the Christians in Rome that the night is far gone and the day is near, so they are to live honorably and keep the Commandments and love one another. Jesus is emphatic. "Keep awake therefore, for you do not know on which day your Lord is coming," he says. Look up and see the possibilities of life and love and joy that abound. Jesus tells us not to put things off, because our time is limited in this world, and if we get hampered by our fears and wait too long, we may never have another chance.




