This week's scriptures: God's call

On this second Sunday after the Epiphany, we get a very different account of Jesus' baptism in the gospel of John. Unlike the gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke, in today's reading, Jesus' baptism is not described, but, immediately afterwards John the Baptist responds that Jesus is the Lamb of God! Then, Jesus calls his first disciples, the brothers Andrew and Peter, who, according to John's gospel, were initially disciples of John, Jesus' cousin. Our reading from the prophet Isaiah underscores John's identification of Jesus as the fulfilment of the one chosen by God to be "a light to the nations, that my salvation may reach to the end of the earth." God's good news of salvation is not meant just for the exiles of Israel but for the entire world. Paul's letter to the church in Corinth, a troubled congregation dealing with many difficult issues amongst its membership, is a comforting reminder that, no matter our concerns, all that we are and have comes from God. And, what we have is enough. We see this in the life and ministry of Martin Luther King, Jr., whose life we celebrate tomorrow. King courageously answered God's call and used the many gifts God gave him to reveal the light of Christ at work in a world where we are all called, without exception, to be saints of God. This is the true meaning of Epiphany.


THE EPISTLE 1 Corinthians 1:1–9

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THE GOSPEL John 1:29-42

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to John.

All Glory to you, Lord Christ.

John saw Jesus coming toward him and declared, "Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world! This is he of whom I said, 'After me comes a man who ranks ahead of me because he was before me.' I myself did not know him; but I came baptizing with water for this reason, that he might be revealed to Israel." And John testified, "I saw the Spirit descending from heaven like a dove, and it remained on him. I myself did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptize with water said to me,

'He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain is the one who baptizes with the Holy Spirit.' And I myself have seen and have testified that this is the Son of God." The next day John again was standing with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he exclaimed, "Look, here is the Lamb of God!" The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. When Jesus turned and saw them following, he said to them, "What are you looking for?" They said to him, "Rabbi" (which translated means Teacher), "where are you staying?" He said to them, "Come and see." They came and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon. One of the two who heard John speak and followed him was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He first found his brother Simon and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" (which is translated Anointed). He brought Simon to Jesus, who looked at him and said, "You are Simon son of John. You are to be called Cephas" (which is translated Peter).

Celebrant Oh God, who came into our midst to enlighten the world, hear the prayers of your faithful people. Grant that your church may see, follow, and itself shine that holy light, so that all may come into your loving embrace. All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ.







The February Faith Forums, at 9:30 a.m. on Sundays, will be devoted to "Episcopal 101" — an introduction to the beliefs and practices of the Episcopal Church. While this series is especially useful for newcomers or those considering baptism or confirmation, everyone is welcome to attend!

Confirmation classes for youth in grades 8 to 12, February and March

We'll gather at St. John's after the 10:30 service for a light lunch, then have a tour of the church, walk to Congregation Beth Israel for a tour of the synagogue, and then carpool to the Berlin Mosque. The tour should end between 2:30 and 3 p.m. Save the date!
