

This week's scriptures: Light breaking into the darkness

Our Old Testament reading from the prophet Isaiah gives a message of hope during a time of deep despair, as the ancient Israelites are being overrun by their enemies, the Assyrians. During this time of war and oppression, Isaiah walks alongside his people and reminds them that God has not forgotten them. He proclaims that God's people will be given a light that breaks open their darkness and, likewise, we will share the light with others as we learn to live together in peace. Paul's letter to the church in Corinth is a reminder of how challenging it can be to live in community, and how the peace and unity we seek is easily disrupted by divisions. In an attempt to deal with this disruption, Paul reminds his flock that they are all called by the same gospel as a new people and should work together reconciling the world to Christ; to love and care for the "other" while bringing peace to all. Matthew's gospel reading begins with John the Baptist's arrest, and then takes us to the very beginning of Jesus' ministry as he calls his first disciples along the shore of the Sea of Galilee. This is where the "light to all nations" will be revealed in the man Jesus to all who have been waiting for the coming of the Messiah. Through his ministry Jesus will show how God is at work in the world as he begins to build up and usher in the kingdom of heaven.

ow I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you be in agreement and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same purpose. For it has been reported to me by Chloe's people that there are quarrels among you, my brothers and sisters. What I mean is that each of you says, "I belong to Paul," or "I belong to Apollos," or "I belong to Cephas," or "I belong to Christ." Has Christ been divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul? I thank God that I baptized none of you except Crispus and Gaius, so that no one can say that you were baptized in my name. (I did baptize also the household of Stephanas; beyond that, I do not know whether I baptized anyone else.) For Christ did not send me to baptize but to proclaim the gospel, and not with eloquent wisdom, so that the cross of Christ might not be emptied of its power. For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.

THE GOSPEL

Matthew 4:12–23

Minister The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Matthew.

All Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Then Jesus heard that John had been arrested, he withdrew to Galilee. He left Nazareth and made his home in Capernaum by the sea, in the territory of Zebulun and Naphtali, so that what had been spoken through the prophet Isaiah might be fulfilled: "Land of Zebulun, land of Naphtali, on the road by the sea, across the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles—the people who sat in darkness have seen a great light, and for those who sat in the region and shadow of death light has dawned." From that time Jesus began to proclaim, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." As he walked by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea—for they were fishermen. And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fish for people." Immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went from there, he saw two other brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John, in the boat with their father Zebedee, mending their nets, and he called them. Immediately they left the boat and their father, and followed him. Jesus went throughout Galilee, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and curing every disease and every sickness among the people.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.
