



THE EPISTLE Romans 4:1–5, 13–17

Abraham was justified by works, he has something to boast about, but not before God. For what does the scripture say? "Abraham believed God, and it was reckoned to him as righteousness." Now to one who works, wages are not reckoned as a gift but as something due. But to one who without works trusts him who justifies the ungodly, such faith is reckoned as righteousness. For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation. For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, "I have made you the

father of many nations")—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist.

There was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews. He came to Jesus by night and said to him, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God." Jesus answered him, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above." Nicodemus said to him, "How can anyone be born after having grown old? 

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN**.

A message from the rector about the coronavirus

Caring for each other and for all the people of God means being careful in the midst of this outbreak. As the coronavirus continues to spread, we're working to minimize risk for our folks at St. John's and the people we serve in our many ministries. Please continue to follow basic hygiene practices to prevent spread of illness, such as frequent hand washing, staying home if you feel sick, and covering your mouth when sneezing or coughing. Here at St. John's, we have hand sanitizer available at all three main entrances and throughout the building. All clergy, Eucharistic ministers and chalice bearers will use hand sanitizer before the distribution of the sacrament, both in the context of our worship service or when visiting someone at home or in the hospital. If someone who is elderly or lives alone does not appear at church as they normally do, please contact the clergy or church office so we can check on them, and let us know if you or anyone in your family becomes ill.

St. John's is following guidelines from our bishops for preventing the spread of illness during worship. Please avoid shaking hands or hugging when greeting one another or passing the Peace. Instead, share the traditional peace sign (fingers in a "V"), touch elbows, or wave. We also ask that you not intinct your communion wafer (dip it in the wine), which is less sanitary than drinking from the common cup because of people's fingers coming in contact with the wine. You may also receive the bread alone, which is considered full and sufficient participation in the Eucharist, or cross your arms over your chest as a sign that you'd like a blessing instead of bread and wine.

Please be assured that the leadership at St. John's is staying informed and prepared so we can keep our community safe and healthy, as well as maintain our worship life and parish events in the midst of this rapidly changing situation. And of course, please keep all those affected by this disease in your prayers.


