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

# THE SECOND LESSON

1 Peter 2:19-25

It is a credit to you if, being aware of God, you endure pain while suffering unjustly. If you endure when you are beaten for doing wrong, what credit is that? But if you endure when you do right and suffer for it, you have God's approval. For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you should follow in his steps. "He committed no sin, and no deceit was found in his mouth." When he was abused, he did not return abuse; when he suffered, he did not threaten; but he entrusted himself to the one who judges justly. He himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, free from sins, we might live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been

healed. For you were going astray like sheep, but now you have returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.

THE GOSPEL John 10:1–10

Minister The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to John.

All Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers." Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them. So again Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly."

For restauranteurs, caterers, and food service workers; Out of the depths. O God, **we cry out to you. Protect them.** 

For hospitality workers—hotel and motel receptionists, servers and housekeepers; Out of the depths. O God, we cry out to you. Protect them.

For grocery and drug store stock clerks, cashiers, suppliers, managers, pharmacists, and delivery drivers, and for those shopping for necessities; Out of the depths. O God, we cry out to you. Protect them.

For daycare center staff who cuddle and comfort children, and for all children; Out of the depths. O God, we cry out to you. Protect them.

For teachers, professors, and staff at schools and universities across the world, and for students everywhere; Out of the depths. O God, we cry out to you. Protect them.

For all who have lost their jobs and worry about being unable to care for their families' basic needs; Out of the depths. O God, we cry out to you. Protect them.

For the homeless crowded in shelters and huddling for warmth over steam grates and under urban bridges; Out of the depths. O God, we cry out to you. Protect them.

For the poor, the lonely, the vulnerable, migrants, and the isolated elderly who have no protectors; Out of the depths. O God, we cry out to you. Protect them.

For the church, hospital chaplains, and all who are working to keep congregations connected; Out of the depths. O God, we cry out to you. Protect them.



We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."
