THE FIRST LESSON

Genesis 45:1–15

oseph could no longer control himself before all those who stood by him, and he cried out, "Send everyone away from me." So no one stayed with him when Joseph made himself known to his brothers. And he wept so loudly that the Egyptians heard it, and the household of Pharaoh heard it. Joseph said to his brothers, "I am Joseph. Is my father still alive?" Guidelines for Outdoor Services

- Please do not attend if any of the following apply. We will continue to offer online services on Sunday mornings, which you may watch live or afterward.
 - You or a household member are in a vulnerable group for COVID-19 infection.
 - You are not feeling well or have symptoms associated with COVID-19.*
 - o You have recently traveled.
 - o You have recently had a positive coronavirus test.
- Outdoor services will be held on the west lawn (the large grassy area on the corner of South Highland Street and Farmington Avenue).
- Bring lawn chairs or a blanket for you/your family to sit on. We will have extra chairs available for those unable to bring their own.
- Maintain a six-foot distance from everyone other than your own household at all times, including when seated, arriving and departing.
- Household members must remain together at all times while on church property.
- Masks/cloth face coverings that cover the nose and mouth are required for those over the age of 2 years.
