

This hymn's popularity increased when its pairing with the tune Michael by the English composer Herbert Howells became more widely known. Howells' son, Michael, born in 1925, had died in childhood from spinal meningitis in 1935. It is believed that shortly after this, in 1936, Howells received a request for a new hymn tune in the morning's post, and he is said to have written the tune, which he named after his late son, over breakfast.

We always give thanks to God for all of you and mention you in our prayers, constantly remembering before our God and Father your work of faith and labor of love and steadfastness of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ. For we know, brothers and sisters beloved by God, that he has chosen you, because our message of the gospel came to you not in word only, but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and with full conviction; just as you know what kind of persons we proved to be among you for your sake. And you became imitators of us and of the Lord, for in spite of persecution you received the word with joy inspired by the Holy Spirit, so that you became an example to all the believers in Macedonia and in Achaia. to wait for his Son from heaven, whom he raised from the dead—Jesus, who rescues us from the wrath that is coming.

She has been considered by many in Europe to be the founder of scientific natural history in Germany. There are more surviving chants by Hildegard than by any other composer from the entire Middle Ages, and she is one of the few known composers to have written both the music and the words.





Guidelines for the Sunday 8 a.m. services in the nave

Starting today, we are holding an 8 a.m. service of spoken Holy Eucharist indoors, in the nave, with safety precautions in place.

If at any time, this weekend or in the future, we determine that holding an indoor service is no longer safe, we will send out an e-newsletter ASAP to let you know.

The following guidelines will be in place. Please review them before attending.

- Masks are required for all attendees (2 years and older).
- Practice social distance with members of other households at all times while on church property.
- Enter through the red doors only.
- Attendees will be seated from front to back, based on the order of your arrival.
- Some pews will be taped off, and an usher or verger will provide guidance on where to sit in open pews to maintain social distance between individuals/households.
- Dismissal will occur from back to front (last in/first out). Please follow directions given by ushers/vergers for where to exit after the service.
- Bulletins will be available to pick up in the narthex. Deposit your bulletin in a recycling bin at church or bring it home; please do not leave it in your pew.
- Bring hand sanitizer or use what we provide.
- If you are not feeling well, are in a group that is particularly vulnerable to COVID-19, or are unable to follow these guidelines for any reason, please stay home and enjoy our 10:30 service via livestream video instead.

Healing prayers at St. John's

"I'm a little embarrassed to come for prayer." While most of us would not be embarrassed to be seen at a medical physician's office, because we understand it's a normal part of staying healthy, we may feel self-conscious about asking someone to pray for us.

Healing prayer is a normal part of our worship at St. John's, just as normal as the other parts of our services, such as the scripture readings and sharing the Eucharist. While we cannot currently offer healing prayer in person at Sunday services, our healing team is available to talk with you by phone, text or e-mail, and to pray with or for you.

All information that you share with a healing minister stays there. Confidentiality is part of the training of every healing minister, and we guard your privacy. You can share as much or as little as you feel comfortable sharing, and a simple "Please pray for me" without further detail is fine.

If you would like to request prayers for healing, please contact the parish office and a St. John's healing minister will get back to you.

Sacred Ground dialogue series on race, dates and times TBD

St. John's will be offering an Episcopal Church program called *Sacred Ground* later this fall, in partnership with St. James's. *Sacred Ground* is a film- and readings-based dialogue series on race, grounded in faith. Small groups are invited to walk through America's history of race and racism, while weaving in threads of family story, economic class, and political and regional identity. The 10-part series is built around a powerful online curriculum of documentary films and readings that focus on Indigenous, Black, Latino, and Asian/Pacific American histories as they intersect with European-American histories. STEWARDSHIP NOTES: CHURCH DURING A PANDEMIC

COVID-19 has affected all of us in so many ways over the past months. We have all faced some form of hardship and loss. Given so much uncertainty, it might feel difficult to make a financial commitment for the year ahead. However, we have much to be thankful for, and much to look forward to, as a parish. We have had to change many ways that we operate and get used to virtual services, but St. John's services and programs have gone on—thanks to your ongoing financial support.

Despite our physical separation from each other and from our beautiful church, our faith and community has continued to grow. We are blessed that our parish has been able not only to stay connected, but also to make a real impact during this time. Susan, Margie, Scott, Ellen, Peggy and Dwight were able to continue to offer an entire array of virtual services with music and keep the church running seamlessly with the support and hard work of our vestry, committees and volunteer clergy.

- We get approximately 200–300 views (live and later) for our 10:30 service each week.
- More than 20 online Music at the Red Door events were held from mid-March through the end of June, and a new season kicks off this week.
- We regularly have 40–50 people in attendance at our 5pm Sunday outdoor service.

Pastoral needs have been extremely high during this time, with parishioners facing loneliness, uncertainty, financial issues, and health concerns. Our clergy has been so involved reaching out and ministering to our congregation. Susan, Margie and Walter, with assistance from the vestry and other parishioners, have been regularly contacting members of our parish community who are alone, sick or in need. This contact has been vitally important to many during this difficult time.

We have also continued to support many missions and organizations. For example, ESOL (English as a Second Language) classes are now provided online, with St. John's continuing the financial support that makes these classes possible. Since mid-March, we have provided Loaves and Fishes with three large deliveries of snacks and juice to be added to pantry bags they are giving out. Also, fresh and free produce from our community garden has been a blessing to many in our neighborhood.

We hope to receive your completed pledge cards by Commitment Sunday, November 8th. Thank you for your prayerful consideration of our annual giving campaign; any amount pledged is gratefully appreciated.
