THE WORD OF GOD

THE FIRST LESSON Deuteronomy 34:1–12

oses went up from the plains of Moab to Mount Nebo, to the top of Pisgah, which is opposite Jericho, and the Lord showed him the whole land: Gilead as far as Dan, all Naphtali, the land of Ephraim and Manasseh, all the land of Judah as far as the Western Sea, the Negeb, and the Plain—that is, the valley of Jericho, the city of palm trees—as far as Zoar. The Lord said to him, "This is the land of which I swore to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob, saying, 'I will give it to your descendants'; I have let you see it with your eyes, but you shall not cross over there." Then Moses, the servant of the Lord, died there in the land of Moab, at the Lord's command. He was buried in a valley in the land of Moab, opposite Beth-peor, but no one knows his burial place to this day. Moses was one hundred twenty years old when he died; his sight was unimpaired and his vigor had not abated. Never since has there arisen a prophet in Israel like Moses, whom the Lord knew face to face. He was unequaled for all the signs and wonders that the Lord sent him to perform in the land of Egypt, against Pharaoh and all his servants and his entire land, and for all the mighty deeds and all the terrifying displays of power that Moses performed in the sight of all Israel.

For our appeal does not spring from deceit or impure motives or trickery, but just as we have been approved by God to be entrusted with the message of the gospel, even so we speak, not to please mortals, but to please God who tests our hearts. As you know and as God is our witness, we never came with words of flattery or with a pretext for greed; nor did we seek praise from mortals, whether from you or from others, though we might have made demands as apostles of Christ. But we were gentle among you, like a nurse tenderly caring for her own children. So deeply do we care for you that we are determined to share with you not only the gospel of God but also our own selves, because you have become very dear to us.

Healing prayers at St. John's

"I'm a little embarrassed to come for prayer." While most of us would not be embarrassed to be seen at a medical physician's office, because we understand it's a normal part of staying healthy, we may feel self-conscious about asking someone to pray for us.

Healing prayer is a normal part of our worship at St. John's, just as normal as the other parts of our services, such as the scripture readings and sharing the Eucharist. While we cannot currently offer healing prayer in person at Sunday services, our healing team is available to talk with you by phone, text or e-mail, and to pray with or for you.

All information that you share with a healing minister stays there. Confidentiality is part of the training of every healing minister, and we guard your privacy. You can share as much or as little as you feel comfortable sharing, and a simple "Please pray for me" without further detail is fine.

If you would like to request prayers for healing, please contact the parish office and a St. John's healing minister will get back to you.

Sunday afternoon outdoor services: October 25 at 5 p.m. and November 1 at 2 p.m.

5 p.m. service this Sunday 10/25: All are welcome to stay afterward for an outdoor showing of the family movie *Coco* starting at 6:30 p.m. Bring a picnic or movie snacks if you like.

2 p.m. service next Sunday 11/1: Note the service time change, and that we will also have turned our clocks back the night before. We have several special events for this final outdoor service.

- Second Annual All Saints Parade at 1:30 p.m.: The Sunday School kids started this new tradition last year, and this year we're inviting everyone, of any age, to participate! The idea is simple: Dress up like the saint of your choice and join in our outdoor All Saints Parade.
- **Fill Blessing Bags after the service:** We distribute Blessing Bags, including toiletries, snacks and warm winter accessories, to people in need who come to the church looking for help. After the 11/1 outdoor service, please stay for a few minutes to put a new supply of Blessing Bags together.

Every Wednesday in November at 12:15 p.m., we'll feature lunchtime recitals from local musicians in their home studios. STEWARDSHIP NOTES: THE ROLE OF THE ENDOWMENT

St. John's is blessed to have an endowment funded by generous past generations of parishioners. Income from our endowment helps support the mission and ministries of St. John's. You might ask why we need your pledge when we have an endowment.


- St. John's runs an extremely tight ship. We operate our extensive programs with a lean staff of two clergy, a
 music director and three other staff members. We also have wonderful volunteer clergy and parishioners
 who support our parish life.
- Annual pledge income and gifts are not sufficient to sustain the parish. We therefore draw from the
 endowment each year to make up the difference. Currently, draws from the endowment cover
 approximately 32% of our annual budget.
- If we continue to draw at this level, the endowment will not be sufficiently funded to provide support in the not-too-distant future.

Although expenses are carefully monitored and we are continually welcoming new members, we have also lost parishioners, as saints leave us and other members move away. To preserve and expand our ministries without jeopardizing the long-term health of the endowment and parish finances, we need your financial support. This is why we ask you to make an annual pledge, and to increase your pledge amount each year if you're able. Pledges made this fall enable us to budget and plan for 2021.

We hope to receive completed pledge cards by Commitment Sunday, November 8th. You should be receiving a pledge card in the mail soon if you haven't already. Please fill out the card and mail it back to the church, or <u>submit your pledge online</u>. If you do not receive a pledge card and would like one, please <u>contact the parish office</u>.
