





Our entire 2020–2021 Music at the Red Door concert series will be livestreamed online, where you can watch concerts in real time or anytime after. We will invite live audiences back when it is safe to do so, but for now, all events are online only. **On December 6 at 12:30 p.m.,** Peter Niedmann will present a Pipes Alive! organ recital of his own compositions for Advent and Christmas.

The festival will be held outdoors under a tent, with on-site sales of:

We will also have a limited selection of evergreen roping that can be purchased by the yard (up to 10-yard lengths). Unfortunately, we will not be offering poinsettias or bulbs this year as we worry about the temperature under the tent, but we will have a few other additions for the greenery table. The wreath decorating night will be Thursday evening, December 3. Each volunteer will work at their own table to ensure social distancing.

- Quarts of homemade soup (sold frozen for you to heat and eat at home)
- Crafts
- Teacup auction raffle
- Online fundraising auction, which will be open for bidding starting on Friday, December 4. More details on auction items and bidding procedures to come!

Safety procedures will include limited capacity in the tent, a cashier station where people will pay for all purchases in one place (with credit/debit cards accepted), and a roving safety patrol who will make sure safety guidelines are followed, sanitize surfaces and pens, etc.
