auhen the Lord was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel. The company of prophets who were in Bethel came out to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he said, "Yes, I know; keep silent." Elijah said to him, "Elisha, stay here; for the Lord has sent me to Jericho." But he said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they came to Jericho. The company of prophets who were at Jericho drew near to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he answered, "Yes, I know; be silent." Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me to the Jordan." But he said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground. When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me what I may do for you, before I am taken from you." Elisha said, "Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit." He responded, "You have asked a hard thing; yet, if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not." As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. Elisha kept watching and crying out, "Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!" But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces.

Irish composer Charles Wood studied with Charles Villiers Stanford at the Royal College of Music in London, and he would himself become a professor of music there, where his pupils would include Ralph Vaughan Williams and Herbert Howells. Wood is chiefly remembered for his Anglican church music, but his earlier years brought a number of choral works. He also composed half a dozen string quartets, partsongs, solo songs and a series of organ preludes.







Emma Lou Diemer (b. 1927)



Emma Lou Diemer's music has been published since 1957 and ranges from hymns and songs to large chamber and orchestral works. She is a native of Kansas City and received her composition degrees from Yale and Eastman. She is professor emeritus at the University of California, Santa Barbara, and has served as organist in various churches, most recently at First Presbyterian in Santa Barbara. Diemer is a keyboard performer and over the years has given concerts of her own organ works at Washington National Cathedral, The Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels in Los Angeles, Grace Cathedral and St.

Mary's Cathedral in San Francisco, and others. Her compositional style over the years has varied from tonal to atonal, from traditional to experimental. She has more than 150 compositions to her name, and continues to write, at the age of 93.

We will offer three in-person outdoor Ash Wednesday services on February 17, at 7 a.m., 12 noon, and 4 p.m. The 4 p.m. service is especially designed for families with children, but all are invited to attend any service. Imposition of ashes will be offered for those who are comfortable receiving them. Outdoor services will be brief! Please dress for the weather. We will also have a 7 p.m. livestreamed service online only, including music and a homily.

Participate in the Great Litany, Sunday, February 21, 7 p.m. on Zoom

Normally on the first Sunday in Lent, we begin the 10:30 service by chanting the Great Litany (a series of confessions and petitions found on page 148 in the Book of Common Prayer) as the choir processes around the church. In lieu of that tradition, this year we will host a recitation of the Great Litany on Zoom starting at 7 p.m. on February 21. All are welcome to participate. The Zoom link will be provided in a special e-newsletter that evening.

Resources for observing a holy Lent

St. John's is offering several resources to support your observation of Lent:

- Lent devotional Our fifth annual Lent devotional booklet created by St. John's members and friends is now available. You may: 1) pick up a printed copy from a bin at the back door of the church building (the ramped entrance), 2) pick up a printed copy at any of the outdoor Ash Wednesday services, or 3) use or print a digital copy, which will be included in the Monday and Thursday e-news this week, and posted on the parish web site home page under "Latest News."
- Cultivating spiritual practice For each week of Lent, we will share simple ideas for trying out a particular spiritual practice. Each Thursday's e-news will include a brief video and graphic about that week's practice. On Sunday mornings, we will hold an online Faith Forum after the 10:30 service, where you may ask questions, discuss ideas, or share your experiences with that week's practice. The forum will begin on Zoom after about 10 minutes of online coffee hour.
- Sunday evening Compline in the Cloister Garden (begins on March 7) The EYC (youth group) will begin holding their Sunday evening gatherings in person, outside in the Cloister Garden, starting on March 7. They will close their time together with Compline, which is an evening prayer service in the Book of Common Prayer. Everyone is invited to join the EYC for Compline, which lasts about 10 minutes. We will have a fire in our outdoor fire pit, and will only cancel in the event of significant precipitation or extreme cold.

Women's book discussion starts again on February 16, 2 p.m.

Women Together begins a seven-week book discussion series on February 16 with *The Meaning of Mary Magdalene: Discovering the Woman at the Heart of Christianity.* The author is Episcopal priest, retreat leader and lecturer Cynthia Bourgeault. The Rev. Dr. Katharine Jefferts Schiori describes the book as "a remarkable invitation into the origins and wisdom of Christianity, through the apostolic witness of Mary Magdalene." Women from St. John's, Trinity, and St. Monica's currently participate, and all women are welcome to join, whether for this series alone or longer. Meetings are weekly via Zoom on Tuesdays, from 2 to 3:15 p.m. For more information, and to receive a link, please contact Sarah Kieffer at kieffer2468@gmail.com.
