


THE SECOND LESSON 1 Peter 3:18–22

THE OFFERTORY ANTHEM Agnus Dei

Georges Bizet (1838–1875)



The Agnus Dei credited to Georges Bizet is based on the Intermezzo from the L'Arlesienne Suite No. 2 taken from Bizet's 1872 music to Alphonse Daudet's play. Bizet had only made one suite out of his L'Arlesienne music, and four years after the death of the composer, the publisher commissioned Bizet's close friend Ernest Guirard to compile another. Apart from preparing this second suit,e Guirard extracted the Intermezzo movement and added the catholic Latin text of the Agnus Dei to it. It was published as another "new" work of Bizet.



THE SANCTUS



Translation: Holy, holy Lord God of hosts. Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People

Christ has died.

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

The Celebrant continues.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN**.

In lieu of that tradition, this year we will host a recitation of the Great Litany on Zoom starting at 7 p.m. tonight. All are welcome to participate. The Zoom link will be provided in a special e-newsletter this evening.

Resources for observing a holy Lent

St. John's is offering several resources to support your observation of Lent:

- Lent devotional Our fifth annual Lent devotional booklet created by St. John's members and friends is now available. You may pick up a printed copy from a bin at the back door of the church building (the ramped entrance), or get a digital copy via the Thursday e-newsletter or at this link: https://tinyurl.com/SJLent2021
- Cultivating spiritual practices For each week of Lent, we will share simple ideas for trying out a particular spiritual practice. Each Thursday's e-news will include a brief video and graphic about that week's practice. On Sunday mornings, we will hold an online Faith Forum after the 10:30 service, where you may ask questions, discuss ideas, or share your experiences. The forum will begin on Zoom after about 10 minutes of online coffee hour. This week's practice is stillness; see the graphic on the next page for details.
- Sunday evening Compline in the Cloister Garden (begins on March 7) The EYC (youth group) will begin holding their Sunday evening gatherings in person, outside in the Cloister Garden, starting on March 7. They will close their time together with Compline, which is an evening prayer service in the Book of Common Prayer. Everyone is invited to join the EYC for Compline, which lasts about 10 minutes. We will have a fire in our outdoor fire pit, and will only cancel in the event of significant precipitation or extreme cold.

Book discussion group with Linda Spiers begins this Wednesday at 7 p.m. on Zoom

Today we welcome the Reverend Linda Spiers (pronounced Spy-ers), who is assisting Margie with Sunday services until we have a new priest in charge. Linda is the former rector of Trinity Church, Collinsville, and has most recently served as interim rector at St. John's, Essex.

This Wednesday evening, February 24, Linda will begin hosting an online book discussion on *Love is the Way* by Presiding Bishop Michael Curry and Sara Grace. The discussion will be held on Zoom starting at 7 p.m. If you're interested in participating, please get the book from your favorite book seller or local library and read the first three chapters by Wednesday. We'll provide the Zoom link in a special e-newsletter that will go out Wednesday evening.

Try repeating one of the following as you exhale:


