#### Welcome!

To ensure everyone's safety, please observe the following guidelines. We will continue to follow the latest recommendations and monitor our local public health situation, and will revise these guidelines as needed:

It is our custom to be silent before the service, so as you take some time to pray, please turn off all electronic devices. All you need to participate in the service is found in this bulletin and in the blue hymnals in each pew.

If you are new to St. John's, or have been attending a while but the parish office doesn't yet have your information, please fill out one of the pew cards and put it in the offering box or hand it to an usher or one of our clergy. Or fill out our online newcomer form at siparish.net/newcomer-form.

Our ushers are here to create a welcoming and safe space for worship; please let them know if you have questions, need assistance, or become aware of a health or safety concern. They have hearing assist devices available for those who need them. We're glad you're here!

Children are always welcome to be in church with their families. We encourage you to sit up front, as they will be more engaged if they can see and hear what's going on. Children are welcome here just as they are; please don't feel you must leave every time your little one makes a sound! We have children's bulletins, books, and other quiet activities available in the narthex (the entrance with the red doors) for children's use during the service. A nursery staffed by high school students is available on Sunday mornings from 9 a.m. to noon; it also has a changing table and rocking chair for parents to use. Sunday School is at 9:30 a.m. every Sunday for all ages.

Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958) is regarded as the greatest English composer since Purcell (who died in 1695—a long time in between "greats"). His compositions span the entire breadth of styles and genres, from symphonies and oratorios to folksong collections. He served as editor of the 1906 English Hymnal, with Percy Dearmer. The Call is part of his collection of Five Mystical Songs, originally written for baritone soloist. Here we can enjoy the rich tapestry of sound and meaning that Vaughan Williams weaves around Herbert's poem, employing plainsong, the modal patterns and intimate textures of English folk music, and the harmonic colors of late Romanticism.



Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN**.




- We held nearly 100 worship services online and in-person, outdoors and indoors.
- We continued our Christian education programs for youth and adults in the parish, online and in-person.
- Our outstanding choirs, with 32 adults and 14 children, sang virtual anthems throughout the pandemic and returned to singing in-person at worship this fall.
- We celebrated 8 baptisms, and prepared 20 young people for confirmation.
- We started a new ministry of making 200 sandwiches a month for the Loaves & Fishes feeding ministry, and continued providing them with a monthly hot meal for 150 people.
- St. John's actively supports many education, food, and housing programs in the Greater Hartford Community with financial donations and volunteers.
- Four weekly 12-step meetings and several other community groups returned to in-person meetings in our building this fall.
- The ESOL program that serves recent immigrants and other English learners (for which St. John's provides space and funding) resumed in-person classes this summer and fall.
- We planted, grew, harvested, and gave away vegetables from our community garden to neighbors in need every Sunday throughout the summer and early fall.
