

Welcome!

To ensure everyone's safety, please observe the following guidelines. We will continue to follow the latest recommendations and monitor our local public health situation, and will revise these guidelines as needed:

Our ushers are here to create a welcoming and safe space for worship; please let them know if you have questions, need assistance, or become aware of a health or safety concern. They have hearing assist devices available for those who need them. We're glad you're here!

Children are always welcome to be in church with their families. We encourage you to sit up front, as they will be more engaged if they can see and hear what's going on. Children are welcome here just as they are; please don't feel you must leave every time your little one makes a sound! We have children's bulletins, books, and other quiet activities available in the narthex (the entrance with the red doors) for children's use during the service. A nursery staffed by high school students is available on Sunday mornings from 9 a.m. to noon; it also has a changing table and rocking chair for parents to use. [Note: There is no nursery care today because all of our nursery workers are being confirmed.] Sunday School is at 9:30 a.m. every Sunday for all ages.



Minister The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to John.

Then Mary came where Jesus was and saw him, she knelt at his feet and said to him, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died." When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who came with her also weeping, he was greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved. He said, "Where have you laid him?" The candidates for Holy Baptism and their sponsors come forward at this time. The candidates for confirmation and reception remain in their seats, and stand in place when they are presented and to answer the questions posed by the Celebrant.

THE PRESENTATION AND EXAMINATION OF THE CANDIDATES

The Celebrant says

The Candidates for Holy Baptism will now be presented.

Sponsors I present [name] to receive the Sacrament of Baptism.

Celebrant Will you be responsible for seeing that they are

being brought up in the Christian faith and life?

Sponsors I will, with God's help.

Celebrant Will you by your prayers and witness help them to grow into

the full stature of Christ?

Sponsors I will, with God's help.

Then the Celebrant asks the following questions of the baptismal candidates.

Question Do you renounce Satan and all the spiritual forces of wickedness that rebel against God?

Answer I renounce them.

Question Do you renounce the evil powers of this world which corrupt and destroy the creatures of

God?

Answer I renounce them.

Question Do you renounce all sinful desires that draw you from the love of God?

Answer I renounce them.

Question Do you turn to Jesus Christ and accept him as your Savior?

Answer I do.

Question Do you put your whole trust in his grace and love?

Answer I do.

Question Do you promise to follow and obey him as your Lord?

Answer I do.

The candidates for confirmation and reception stand in place when they are presented.

Celebrant The candidates for confirmation will now be presented.

Presenter I present these persons for confirmation.

Celebrant The candidates for reception will now be presented.

Presenter I present these persons to be received into this Communion.

Then the Celebrant asks the following questions of the confirmation and reception candidates.

Celebrant Do you reaffirm your renunciation of evil?

Candidates I do.

Celebrant Do you renew your commitment to Jesus Christ?

Candidates I do, and with God's grace I will follow him as my Savior and Lord.

The Celebrant addresses the congregation saying

Will you who witness these vows do all in your power to support these persons in their life in

Christ?

People We will.

Bishop Let us join with those who are committing themselves to Christ and renew our own baptismal

covenant.

THE BAPTISMAL COVENANT

All stand.

Celebrant Do you believe in God the Father?

People I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Celebrant Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

People I believe in Jesus Christ, the only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the

Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will

come again to judge the living and the dead.

Celebrant Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

People I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the

forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

Celebrant Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in

the prayers?

People I will, with God's help.

Celebrant Will you persevere in resisting evil, and whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to

the Lord?

People **I will, with God's help**.

Celebrant Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?

People **I will, with God's help.**

Celebrant Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself?

People I will, with God's help.

Celebrant Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every

human being?

People I will, with God's help.

THE PRAYERS FOR THE CANDIDATES

During the prayers, the candidates for baptism and their sponsors go with the clergy to the baptismal font.

Let us now pray for those who are to receive the Sacrament of new birth, and for those

who have renewed their commitment to Christ. Deliver them O Lord, from the way of sin and death.

People Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader Open their heart to your grace and truth.

People Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader Fill them with your holy and life-giving Spirit.

People Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader Keep them in the faith and communion of your holy Church.

People Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader Teach them to love others in the power of the Spirit.

People Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader Send them into the world in witness to your love.

People Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader Bring them to the fullness of your peace and glory.

People Lord, hear our prayer.

Celebrant Grant, O Lord, that all who are baptized into the death of Jesus Christ your Son may live

in the power of his resurrection and look for him to come again in glory; who lives and

reigns now and for ever. Amen.

THANKSGIVING OVER THE WATER

Celebrant The Lord be with you. *People* **And also with you.**

Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.People It is right to give God thanks and praise.

The Celebrant continues

We thank you, Almighty God, for the gift of water. Over it the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation. Through it you led the children of Israel out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise. In it your Son Jesus received the baptism of John and was anointed by the Holy Spirit as the Messiah, the Christ, to lead us, through his death and resurrection, from the bondage of sin into everlasting life. We thank you, Father, for the water of Baptism. In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection. Through it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit. Therefore in joyful obedience to your Son, we bring into his fellowship those who come to him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Now sanctify this water, we pray you, by the power of your Holy Spirit, that those who here are cleansed from sin and born again may continue for ever in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior. To him, to you, and to the Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory, now and for ever.

People Amen.

THE BAPTISMS

The Priest says to the candidate

[Name], I baptize you in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

All Amen.

Then the Celebrant places a hand on the candidate's head, marking on their forehead the sign of the cross and saying You are sealed by the Holy Spirit in Baptism and marked as Christ's own for ever.

All Amen.

Celebrant Let us pray. Heavenly Father, we thank you that by water and the Holy Spirit you have

bestowed upon your servants the forgiveness of sin, and have raised them to the new life of grace. Sustain them, O Lord, in your Holy Spirit. Give them an inquiring and discerning heart, the courage to will and to persevere, a spirit to know and to love you, and the gift of

joy and wonder in all your works.

All Amen.

Celebrant Let us welcome the newly baptized.

All We receive you into the household of God. Confess the faith of Christ crucified,

proclaim his resurrection, and share with us in his eternal priesthood.

THE BAPTISMAL HYMN 296 We know that Christ is raised and dies no more ENGELBERG All sing. During the hymn, the baptismal party returns to their seats, and the clergy return to the chancel.

THE CONFIRMATIONS

The candidates for confirmation come forward.

The Celebrant lays hands upon each candidate and prays

Strengthen, O Lord, your servant [name] with your Holy Spirit, empower them for your service, and sustain them all the days of their life.

Celebrant Almighty and everliving God, let your fatherly hand ever be over these your servants; let your Holy Spirit ever be with them; and so lead them in the knowledge and obedience of your Word, that they may serve you in this life, and dwell with you in the life to come; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

People Amen.

THE RECEPTIONS

The candidates for reception come forward.

The Celebrant greets each candidate, then lays hands upon them and prays

[Name], we recognize you as a member of the one holy catholic and apostolic Church, and we receive you into the fellowship of this Communion. God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, bless, preserve, and keep you. **Amen.**

THE PEACE

Celebrant The peace of the Lord be always with you.

All And also with you.



It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth. For in the multitude of your saints you have surrounded us with a great cloud of witnesses, that we might rejoice in their fellowship, and run with endurance the race that is set before us; and, together with them, receive the crown of glory that never fades away. Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:



All remain standing or kneel.

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN**.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

The apparent simplicity of God be in my head, with its repetition of the key phrase, suddenly gives way to very effective harmonic sophistication on the word "heart" that lays the path for the twilit ambience of the final phrase. H. Walford Davies was composer and musical director at the University of Wales as well as organist at, among others, Temple Church, where his student Leopold Stokowski (later one of the leading conductors of the 20th century) assisted him.

Making St. John's a Safe Place for All

In the 2nd chapter of the letter to the Ephesians, the author writes: "So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone." As a community of faith, we are members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the faithful who have gone before us at St. John's, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone. Upon this firm foundation, St. John's Church has been worshipping God and growing in faith for almost 180 years.

We currently have much to celebrate at St. John's, as we launch a new program year with Todd FitzGerald as our new priest in charge. With masks required and distancing encouraged, we have returned to in-person worship with singing and communion, as well as on-site Christian education, concerts, and more. These new beginnings have led us to review our policies and practices, including those intended to keep our community safe and healthy.

- All employees, along with volunteers who work with children, oversee money, and fill certain other roles, must complete a **background check**.
- Safe Church Training¹ is required for employees and certain volunteers, including the vestry and those who work with children, and is recommended for all church members. Grounded in our call to seek and serve Christ in all persons and respect the dignity of every human being, this free training provided by the Episcopal Church in Connecticut (ECCT) reviews practices for ensuring that all who participate in church activities, especially the most vulnerable (such as children and elders), are safe.
- o We have safeguards in place to protect everyone in our community while welcoming individuals who have sinned, repented, and are seeking amendment of life, such as someone with a criminal record. In the case of a registered sex offender attending worship, the ECCT provides a covenant² entered into by the offender and the clergy on behalf of the parish, which sets clear boundaries and supervision guidelines to promote the safety of all who worship here. As we seek to be faithful to the Great Commandment, to love God and love neighbor as self, we strive to welcome other sinners who sincerely seek worship, discipleship, and an opportunity to experience the love of Christ.
- O As we have learned throughout the pandemic, clear guidelines for behaviors and practices enable us to gather safely as a community of faith. For example, we have learned the benefits of mask wearing, maintaining physical distance, and vaccinations to protect all members of the community against Covid-19. We will continue to allow our local health situation and expert recommendations to inform our Covid guidelines.
- With St. John's located on a major street and bus line, the safety of our property and people in the building
 is a priority. Security cameras and a computerized locking system on church doors allow us to control and
 monitor traffic in the building. These devices help us maintain an open and welcoming environment, while
 guarding the safety of all who use our buildings.
- o In accord with the ECCT's guidelines regarding consumption of alcoholic beverages,³ we adhere to **rules for the serving of alcohol** in the building (and at church functions off-site), and require outside groups using our building to do likewise.

These measures are in place to help us, as the body of Christ, to be faithful to our calling as members of the household of God.
