Welcome!

Our ushers are here to create a welcoming and safe space for worship; please let them know if you have questions, need assistance, or become aware of a health or safety concern. They have hearing assist devices available for those who need them. We're glad you're here!

Children are always welcome to be in church with their families. We encourage you to sit up front, as they will be more engaged if they can see and hear what's going on. Children are welcome here just as they are; please don't feel you must leave every time your little one makes a sound! We have children's bulletins, books, and other quiet activities available in the narthex (the entrance with the red doors) for children's use during the service. A nursery staffed by high school students is available on Sunday mornings from 9 a.m. to noon; it also has a changing table and rocking chair for parents to use. Sunday School is at 9:30 a.m. every Sunday for all ages.




THE SECOND LESSON





Making St. John's a Safe Place for All

In the 2nd chapter of the letter to the Ephesians, the author writes: "So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone." As a community of faith, we are members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the faithful who have gone before us at St. John's, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone. Upon this firm foundation, St. John's Church has been worshipping God and growing in faith for almost 180 years.

We currently have much to celebrate at St. John's, as we launch a new program year with Todd FitzGerald as our new priest in charge. With masks required and distancing encouraged, we have returned to in-person worship with singing and communion, as well as on-site Christian education, concerts, and more. These new beginnings have led us to review our policies and practices, including those intended to keep our community safe and healthy.

- All employees, along with volunteers who work with children, oversee money, and fill certain other roles, must complete a background check.
- Safe Church Training¹ is required for employees and certain volunteers, including the vestry and those who work with children, and is recommended for all church members. Grounded in our call to seek and serve Christ in all persons and respect the dignity of every human being, this free training provided by the Episcopal Church in Connecticut (ECCT) reviews practices for ensuring that all who participate in church activities, especially the most vulnerable (such as children and elders), are safe.
- o We have safeguards in place to protect everyone in our community while welcoming individuals who have sinned, repented, and are seeking amendment of life, such as someone with a criminal record. In the case of a registered sex offender attending worship, the ECCT provides a covenant² entered into by the offender and the clergy on behalf of the parish, which sets clear boundaries and supervision guidelines to promote the safety of all who worship here. As we seek to be faithful to the Great Commandment, to love God and love neighbor as self, we strive to welcome other sinners who sincerely seek worship, discipleship, and an opportunity to experience the love of Christ.
- O As we have learned throughout the pandemic, clear guidelines for behaviors and practices enable us to gather safely as a community of faith. For example, we have learned the benefits of mask wearing, maintaining physical distance, and vaccinations to protect all members of the community against Covid-19. We will continue to allow our local health situation and expert recommendations to inform our Covid guidelines.
- With St. John's located on a major street and bus line, the safety of our property and people in the building
 is a priority. Security cameras and a computerized locking system on church doors allow us to control and
 monitor traffic in the building. These devices help us maintain an open and welcoming environment, while
 guarding the safety of all who use our buildings.
- In accord with the ECCT's guidelines regarding consumption of alcoholic beverages,³ we adhere to rules
 for the serving of alcohol in the building (and at church functions off-site), and require outside groups
 using our building to do likewise.

These measures are in place to help us, as the body of Christ, to be faithful to our calling as members of the household of God.

If you have questions about these or other issues related to the safety of our community, please reach out to the clergy or wardens.


