

Welcome!

Children are always welcome to be in church with their families. We encourage you to sit up front, as they will be more engaged if they can see and hear what's going on. Children are welcome here just as they are; please don't feel you must leave every time your little one makes a sound! We have children's bulletins, books, and other quiet activities available in the narthex (the entrance with the red doors) for children's use during the service. While a nursery staffed by high school students is normally available on Sunday mornings from 9 a.m. to noon, we are temporarily closing the nursery during the current Covid surge. Parents are still welcome to use the nursery if you need a changing table or a quiet spot. Sunday School is at 9:30 a.m. for all ages.

and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." 

St. John's Annual Meeting, Sunday, January 30

The Annual Meeting of the parish will take place on Sunday, January 30 from 9 to 10 a.m. in the church. The meeting will also be livestreamed online for those who are unable to attend in-person. There will be a normal schedule of two Sunday services at 8 and 10:30 a.m., with the meeting taking place between the services.

At the Annual Meeting, the parish holds elections, votes on several annual resolutions, and hears reports from clergy, staff, and lay leaders.

The slate of candidates to be voted on is as follows. Vestry members are elected to three-year terms. Wardens and treasurers are elected for up to three consecutive one-year terms. (Note: Due to a need for leadership continuity during the clergy transition and ongoing pandemic conditions, a decision was made last year to allow the current cotreasurers, Tim Goetz and John Roche, to be nominated for additional one-year terms. This year, Tim will be stepping down as co-treasurer after serving four one-year terms, while John Roche has agreed to continue for a fifth one-year term, after which he will also step down.)



Kara Hart — Kara and her husband Matthew moved to West Hartford in 2017 with their daughters, Sophie and Claire. Previously, they lived in Mansfield, CT and attended Saint Mark's Episcopal Chapel. Since arriving at St. John's, Kara has enjoyed singing with the choir, and has served on the vestry for the past year. By day she applies her background in the study of Spanish to the practice of immigration law. Kara loves spending time with her family and supporting the work of a nonprofit choral organization that is devoted to creating community through choral music.

Nominated as Co-Treasurer

Anne Harney - Anne Harney has been a member of St. John's since the fall of 2012, when she joined with her two teenaged children. Having been drawn to St. John's by the music program, she and her daughter immediately joined the choir. Except for a brief hiatus in 2015–16 to study and sit for the CPA exam, she has remained a member of the choir and considers them a much-loved second family. Anne was raised in Cheshire, CT, and grew up in the Lutheran church there, where her father was minister from 1960–1994. She was educated at the Lutheran-based Concordia College in Bronxville, NY, where she earned her



undergraduate degree in mathematics. She joined the Episcopal Church in 1994 at Christ Church Cathedral, Lexington, KY. Having returned to Connecticut in 1998, Anne has been a member of various Episcopal churches in the state. In the last 10 years, she has taken four trips to England with various choirs, to spend a week-in-residence singing daily choral evensong at three different cathedrals — Ely Cathedral, Lincoln Cathedral (twice), and Southwark Cathedral in London — and considers those trips to be definitive in her spiritual and personal growth. Anne currently works as a senior tax manager at the public accounting firm Mahoney Sabol, CPAs, in Glastonbury.
