Jean Langlais (1907–1991)



Jean Langlais became blind due to glaucoma when he was two years old, and was sent to the National Institute for Blind Children in Paris, where he began to study the organ. From there, he progressed to the Paris Conservatoire, where he won prizes in organ and studied composition and improvisation. After graduating, Langlais returned to the National Institute for Blind Children to teach, and also taught at the Schola Cantorum in Paris from 1961 to 1976. Many of his students went on to become important musicians, including organists and composers. It was as an organist that Langlais made his name, following in the footsteps of César Franck and Charles Tournemire as organist at the Basilica of Sainte-Clotilde in Paris in 1945, a post in which he remained until 1988. He was much in demand as a concert organist, and widely toured across Europe and the United States.

THE FIRST LESSON

Genesis 43:3–11, 15

#### THE SECOND LESSON

1 Corinthians 15:35-38, 42-50


Someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body. So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. Thus it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being"; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. But it is not the spiritual that is first, but the physical, and then the spiritual. The first man was from the earth, a man of dust; the second man is from heaven. As was the man of dust, so are those who are of the dust; and as is the man of heaven, so are those who are of heaven. Just as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we will also bear the image of the man of heaven. What I am saying, brothers and sisters, is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable.





#### **Blessing Box Shopping List**

The Blessing Box or "little free food pantry" located on St. John's front lawn gets used frequently by community residents in need of food. We've talked to a few people who have used the Blessing Box about what types of food are most helpful to them. Many don't have access to kitchen facilities and need ready-to-eat foods. The next time you're grocery shopping, please pick up a few of these items if you're able, and leave them in the Blessing Box. If the box is full, hang onto the items and try again another time. Thank you!

- Peanut butter Small jars or squeeze packs
- Tuna, Vienna sausages, other shelf-stable meat or fish in cans or foil packs
- Nuts, dried fruit, trail mix, other protein-rich packaged snacks (roasted chickpeas, sesame sticks)
- Protein bars, granola bars
- Cracker packs with peanut butter or cheese
- Bread, rolls, bagels (These items will not work well in warm weather, but right now, the cold will protect them from spoilage and pests.)

- Applesauce or other fruit in cans, jars, or single-serve packages




