

Welcome!

Children are always welcome to be in church with their families. We encourage you to sit up front, as they will be more engaged if they can see and hear what's going on. Children are welcome here just as they are; please don't feel you must leave every time your little one makes a sound! We have children's bulletins, books, and other quiet activities available in the narthex (the entrance with the red doors) for children's use during the service. While a nursery staffed by high school students is normally available on Sunday mornings from 9 a.m. to noon, we are temporarily closing the nursery during the current Covid surge. Parents are still welcome to use the nursery if you need a changing table or a quiet spot. Sunday School is at 9:30 a.m. for all ages.

Thomas H. Kerr (1915–1988)



Thomas Henderson Kerr, Jr., born in Baltimore, Maryland, was raised in a musical family. His father was a famous orchestra leader and composer. From a young age, Kerr played the piano, even teaching himself how to play the organ. At the age of 14, he was playing for churches and in nightclubs. Kerr dreamed of attending the Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore, but African American students were not admitted at that time. Instead, he attended Howard University for one year before continuing his musical studies at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, where he completed his bachelor of music degree in piano and

theory, as well as his master's degree in theory. Kerr received honors and prizes in composition and performed many times as piano soloist with the National Symphony Orchestra.

THE WORD OF GOD

THE FIRST LESSON All sit.

Nehemiah 8:1–3, 5–6, 8–10

ll the people of Israel gathered together into the square before the Water Gate. They told the scribe Ezra to bring the book of the law of Moses, which the Lord had given to Israel. Accordingly, the priest Ezra brought the law before the assembly, both men and women and all who could hear with understanding. This was on the first day of the seventh month. He read from it facing the square before the Water Gate from early morning until midday, in the presence of the men and the women and those who could understand; and the ears of all the people were attentive to the book of the law. And Ezra opened the book in the sight of all the people, for he was standing above all the people; and when he opened it, all the people stood up. Then Ezra blessed the Lord, the great God, and all the people answered, "Amen, Amen," lifting up their hands. Then they bowed their heads and worshiped the Lord with their faces to the ground. So they read from the book, from the law of God, with interpretation. They gave the sense, so that the people understood the reading. And Nehemiah, who was the governor, and Ezra the priest and scribe, and the Levites who taught the people said to all the people, "This day is holy to the Lord your God; do not mourn or weep." For all the people wept when they heard the words of the law. Then he said to them, "Go your way, eat the fat and drink sweet wine and send portions of them to those for whom nothing is prepared, for this day is holy to our Lord; and do not be grieved, for the joy of the Lord is your strength."

THE SECOND LESSON

1 Corinthians 12:12-31a

ust as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit. Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot would say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear would say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many members, yet one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and those members of the body that we think less honorable we clothe with greater honor, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it. Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers; then deeds of power, then gifts of healing, forms of assistance, forms of leadership, various kinds of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? But strive for the greater gifts.

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THE GOSPEL Luke 4:14–21

Minister The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Luke.

THE NICENE CREED





We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. 

THE VOLUNTARY Carillon de Longpont from Pièces en style libre

Louis Vierne (1870–1937)



In 1913, Louis Vierne spent the summer with the De Montesquiou family at their chateâu in Longpont, a town northeast of Paris. On August 15, the Feast of the Assumption, Vierne accompanied hymns during the procession, using a harmonium, mounted on a cart drawn by two donkeys. Later that day, he composed Carillon du Longpont based on the theme of the peal of the three bells and a clock bell in the belfry of the chateâu's small chapel. Vierne dedicated the piece to his brother, Rene, also an organist. Sadly, Rene was killed in a battle during the First World War, waged east of Longpont.

The closing voluntary is a part of worship, extending the beauty of holiness so that the congregation can remember and give thanks for God's Word as it has been experienced this day. All are invited to say **Amen** at the end of the voluntary as a conclusion to our worship.

St. John's Annual Meeting, Sunday, January 30

The Annual Meeting of the parish will take place on Sunday, January 30 from 9 to 10 a.m. in the church. The meeting will also be livestreamed online for those who are unable to attend in-person. There will be a normal schedule of two Sunday services at 8 and 10:30 a.m., with the meeting taking place between the services.

At the Annual Meeting, the parish holds elections, votes on several annual resolutions, and hears reports from clergy, staff, and lay leaders.

The slate of candidates to be voted on is as follows. Vestry members are elected to three-year terms. Wardens and treasurers are elected for up to three consecutive one-year terms. (Note: Due to a need for leadership continuity during the clergy transition and ongoing pandemic conditions, a decision was made last year to allow the current cotreasurers, Tim Goetz and John Roche, to be nominated for additional one-year terms. This year, Tim will be stepping down as co-treasurer after serving four one-year terms, while John Roche has agreed to continue for a fifth one-year term, after which he will also step down.)

To serve a three-year term on the vestry:
