n the first day of the week, at early dawn, the women who had come with Jesus from Galilee came to the tomb, taking the spices that they had prepared. 



A message from Scott Lamlein, director of music


I will be away on a three-month sabbatical beginning on April 25, returning on July 25. By my original agreement with the church, I'm allowed a three-month sabbatical after every five years of completed work. This was originally scheduled for 2020, but, well, you know what happened!

A sabbatical, from the word "sabbath," is an extended rest. In church work, it is an opportunity to periodically take away the regular list of responsibilities and shift focus to something that recharges one's batteries spiritually and mentally — coming back refreshed, renewed, and improved. For me, that will mean travel for recitals (Germany and St-Sulpice, Paris - a huge honor), a spiritual retreat, an uninterrupted practice retreat, and some time with my family and home projects.

During my time away, I will not be available via email, and messages sent to me during that time will not be read (even after I return), so please save up your communications for August.

I honestly have mixed feelings about the extended break. The relationship in Christ's love that we share, with and without the music, is very dear and important to me, and so I will miss you all greatly during the time away. I'll show up again later in the summer and get moving on Choir Camp, Kids Community Music Camp, and most important, getting ready for a fall choir season that is as close to normal as possible. Music is already planned through Christmas, and I'm very excited about a full new season for Music at the Red Door. The spiritual, mental, musical diversion of the break will only make that better. 
