Our staffed nursery is open from 9 a.m. to noon on Sunday mornings for children age 5 and younger. Parents are welcome to drop little ones there for part or all of the service, and there is a changing table and rocking chair should your child need to be changed, fed, or soothed.



So he summoned him and said to him, 'What is this that I hear about you? Give me an accounting of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer.' Then the manager said to himself, 'What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes.' So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' He answered, 'A hundred jugs of olive oil.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty.' Then he asked another, 'And how much do you owe?' He replied, 'A hundred containers of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill and make it eighty.' And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes. Samuel Coleridge-Taylor (1875–1912) Words: Psalm 97:10

O ye that love the Lord, see that ye hate the thing which is evil: the Lord preserveth the souls of his saints; he shall deliver them from the hand of the ungodly.



Born to a white English mother and a father from Sierra Leone, Coleridge-Taylor achieved such success that he was referred to by white New York musicians as the "African Mahler." By 1896, Coleridge-Taylor was already earning a reputation as a composer. He was particularly known for his three cantatas on the epic poem Song of Hiawatha, by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow. Coleridge-Taylor premiered the first section in 1898, when he was 22. After Charles Villiers Stanford conducted the full premiere of the work in 1898, Coleridge-Taylor proved to be highly popular and made three tours of the United States. He participated as the youngest delegate at the 1900 First Pan-African Conference held in London, and met leading Americans through this connection, including scholar and activist W.E.B. Du Bois.


