Mark Fax (1911–1974)



Born in Baltimore, Maryland, Mark Fax was a child prodigy who was employed by age 14 as a theater organist and church organist. Fax studied at Syracuse University, where he earned a B.Mus. in 1933, then at Eastman where he earned a master's degree in composition, studying with Howard Hanson. He founded and chaired the music department at Paine College in Georgia. From 1947 to 1972, Fax taught music theory at Howard University and served as director of the school of music. Fax composed works for chorus, symphony, chamber ensemble, voice, piano, and organ, in addition to two full-length operas.



2 Thessalonians 3:6–13

Tow we command you, beloved, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to keep away from believers who are living in idleness and not according to the tradition that they received from us. For you yourselves know how you ought to imitate us; we were not idle when we were with you, and we did not eat anyone's bread without paying for it; but with toil and labor we worked night and day, so that we might not burden any of you. THE GOSPEL

Luke 21:5–19

Then some were speaking about the temple, how it was adorned with beautiful stones and gifts dedicated to God, Jesus said, "As for these things that you see, the days will come when not one stone will be left upon another; all will be thrown down." They asked him, "Teacher, when will this be, and what will be the sign that this is about to take place?" And he said, "Beware that you are not led astray; for many will come in my name and say, 'I am he!' and, 'The time is near!' Do not go after them. When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; for these things must take place first, but the end will not follow immediately." Then he said to them, "Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and plagues; and there will be dreadful portents and great signs from heaven. But before all this occurs, they will arrest you and persecute you; they will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. This will give you an opportunity to testify. So make up your minds not to prepare your defense in advance; for I will give you words and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, by relatives and friends; and they will put some of you to death. You will be hated by all because of my name. But not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your souls."

At the age of eight, Noel Rawsthorne became a chorister at Liverpool Parish Church, which started his interest in the pipe organ. He became organist of Liverpool Cathedral in 1955, and served in this capacity until 1980. His work with the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra included supervision of the refurbishment of the organ in the Philharmonic Hall, and he sustained substantial friendships, personal and professional, with successive maestros of the Philharmonic.






