

smoothly through a range of keys and moods, from the gentle simplicity of the opening "Blessed are the poor in spirit" to the more dramatic and colorful "Blessed are ye, when men shall revile you".

Where does the money that supports the ministries of St. John's come from? It comes from the generosity of <u>you</u> and others, including those who have remembered St. John's in their estate plans.

Stewardship 2022 numbers you should know:

Parish budget - \$1,026,904

Pledging households – 153

Total amount of all pledges - \$507,904

Pledge receipts account for 47% of our budget

We are dependent on the endowment for 40% of our budget

The remainder of our revenue comes from plate receipts, fundraising, rentals, etc.

Average household pledge for 2022 - \$3,320

Median household pledge for 2022 - \$2,000

From a financial appeal standpoint, we ask that you consider the following:

- It costs about \$2,800 per day to run St. John's many ministries, from worship and education to music and community service, or about \$6,700 per year for each pledging household,
- We fund our programs, ministries and church operations through our pledges, gifts, events, offerings, and use of endowment resources.
- Pledges are currently received from slightly more than 50% of our total membership.
- Each additional member household that pledges helps to raise more funds to sustain and grow our programs, as well as to increase engagement across our community. Greater engagement brings benefits far beyond financial ones, as St. John's ministries are energized and expanded.

The amount of your pledge is an individual decision and will reflect your own life situation and sense of commitment to the church. The stewardship goal this year is to receive a pledge from *everyone*.





