Minister The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Luke.

In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn. In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. 



Stay connected with your St. John's community by setting up your profile in Realm!

Realm is a cloud-based database for managing church membership records. With a computer or smartphone, church members can use Realm to access an online parish directory, manage their own individual and family information, pledge online, pay pledges online, keep track of pledges and gifts, communicate with parish ministry groups, register and pay for events, and more.

Realm will be most useful to both church staff and parishioners if EVERYONE who has online access signs up, whether or not you expect to use Realm regularly. **It is especially important that you set up your privacy settings,** as you will only be included in the parish directory if you select "Anyone in the church" in your privacy settings.

All adult church members for whom we have a working e-mail address should have received an e-mail invitation to set up login credentials and a profile in Realm. The e-mail subject line read **St. John's Episcopal Church: Join our online community!** The e-mail includes straightforward instructions for the set-up process, and a link to a PDF document with more detailed information.

If you did NOT receive an e-mail invitation, please contact Ellen in the parish office (ellen@sjparish.net) with your preferred e-mail address.

If you previously set up login credentials for making online gifts/pledge payments and/or using the Church Life app, you may login to Realm at onrealm.org/sjparish with those credentials (you will be prompted to reset your password). A document with step-by-step instructions for setting up your profile is available at either entrance to the church, or online at sjparish.net/realmhowto. It's best to use a computer to set up your Realm account, and then download the Realm Connect app for use on your smartphone or tablet.
