

The nursery is also equipped with a changing table and rocking chair for parents/caregivers to use as needed.

Undine Smith-Moore (1904-1989)



Undine Eliza Anna Smith Moore, the "dean of Black women composers," was an American composer and professor of music in the 20th century. Moore was originally trained as a classical pianist, but developed a compositional output of mostly vocal music—her preferred genre. Much of her work was inspired by Black spirituals and folk music. Undine Smith Moore was a renowned teacher, and once stated that she experienced "teaching itself as an art."

THE FIRST LESSON Exodus 17:1–7

From the wilderness of Sin the whole congregation of the Israelites journeyed by stages, as the Lord commanded. They camped at Rephidim, but there was no water for the people to drink. The people quarreled with Moses, and said, "Give us water to drink." Moses said to them, "Why do you quarrel with me? Why do you test the Lord?" But the people thirsted there for water; and the people complained against Moses and said, "Why did you bring us out of Egypt, to kill us and our children and livestock with thirst?" So Moses cried out to the Lord, "What shall I do with this people? They are almost ready to stone me." The Lord said to Moses, "Go on ahead of the people, and take some of the elders of Israel with you; take in your hand the staff with which you struck the Nile, and go. I will

Philippians 1:1–13

If then there is any encouragement in Christ, any consolation from love, any sharing in the Spirit, any compassion and sympathy, make my joy complete: be of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did

not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. Therefore, my beloved, just as you have always obeyed me, not only in my presence, but much more now in my absence, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling; for it is God who is at work in you, enabling you both to will and to work for his good pleasure.

THE GOSPEL Matthew 21:23–32

Minister The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Matthew.

All Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Then Jesus entered the temple, the chief priests and the elders of the people came to him as he was teaching, and said, "By what authority are you doing these things, and who gave you this authority?" Jesus said to them, "I will also ask you one question; if you tell me the answer, then I will also tell you by what authority I do these things. Did the baptism of John come from heaven, or was it of human origin?" And they argued with one another, "If we say, 'From heaven,' he will say to us, 'Why then did you not believe him?' But if we say, 'Of human origin,' we are afraid of the crowd; for all regard John as a prophet." So they answered Jesus, "We do not know." And he said to them, "Neither will I tell you by what authority I am doing these things. "What do you think? A man had two sons; he went to the first and said, 'Son, go and work in the vineyard today.' He answered, 'I will not'; but later he changed his mind and went. The father went to the second and said the same; and he answered, 'I go, sir'; but he did not go. Which of the two did the will of his father?" They said, "The first." Jesus said to them, "Truly I tell you, the tax collectors and the prostitutes are going into the kingdom of God ahead of you. For John came to you in the way of righteousness and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the prostitutes believed him; and even after you saw it, you did not change your minds and believe him."


Have mercy, Lord, for we are sinners in your sight.

St. John's Online Parish Directory



- Our membership management software, Realm, includes an online directory that members can access through the St. John's Realm web site (onrealm.org/sjparish) or the Realm Connect smartphone app.
- The only people who can access this directory are other parish members approved by the parish office who have set up login credentials.
- If you do NOT want to be listed in the password-protected online directory, please let Ellen in the parish office know ASAP.
- You may receive an automated email from Realm informing you of a "privacy change." This notification just means that Ellen has changed your profile settings to ensure that you are included in the directory. If it says that your information is available to "Anyone in the church," keep in mind that "anyone" refers only to people with login credentials who are known to the parish office. At no time is your information accessible online to those not affiliated with the church.
- If you have not yet logged into Realm to see all it can do, give it a try! With a Realm account, you can access the online directory, track your pledge progress, make a pledge, set up one-time or recurring pledge payments or gifts, see a list of previous pledge payments and gifts, communicate with your volunteer groups, register and pay for events (such as the annual Choir School camp), and more.
- To be approved and set up login credentials, go to our St. John's Realm web site at onrealm.org/sjparish and click the link to request login access. Once Ellen approves your access, you will receive an email invitation with instructions for how to set up your credentials. Set-up involves creating a password and verifying your email address, so make sure to complete all of the steps.
- A link to Realm is always available on the main menu of our web site at sjparish.net.
- Once you have login credentials set up, download the Realm Connect app on your phone, so you always have access to the directory and your own information on the go.
- Please upload a recent photo of yourself/your family, as the online directory is most useful when it includes photos to help everyone match names and faces.




