#### THE ORGAN VOLUNTARY Praeludium

Zoltan Kodály (1882–1967)



Zoltán Kodály was a Hungarian composer, ethnomusicologist, pedagogue, linguist, and philosopher. Throughout his adult life, Kodály was very interested in the problems of many types of music education, and he wrote a large amount of material on teaching methods as well as composing plenty of music intended for children's use. Beginning in 1935, along with his colleague Jenő Ádám, he embarked on a long-term project to reform music

teaching in Hungary's lower and middle schools. His work resulted in the publication of several highly influential books. He is well known internationally as the creator of the Kodály method of music education.

#### THE WORD OF GOD

THE FIRST LESSON

Exodus 32:1–14

All sit.

Then the people saw that Moses delayed to come down from the mountain, the people gathered around Aaron, and said to him, "Come, make gods for us, who shall go before us; as for this Moses, the man who brought us up out of the land of Egypt, we do not know what has become of him." Aaron said to them, "Take off the gold rings that are on the ears of your wives, your sons, and your daughters, and bring them to me." So all the people took off the gold rings from their ears, and brought them to Aaron. He took the gold from them, formed it in a mold, and cast an image of a calf; and they said, "These are your gods, O Israel, who brought you up out of the land of Egypt!" When Aaron saw this, he built an altar before it; and Aaron made proclamation and said, "Tomorrow shall be a festival to the Lord." They rose early the next day, and offered burnt offerings and brought sacrifices of well-being; and the people sat down to eat and drink, and rose up to revel. The Lord said to Moses, "Go down at once! Your people, whom you brought up out of the land of Egypt, have acted perversely; they have been quick to turn aside from the way that I commanded them; they have cast for themselves an image of a calf, and have worshiped it and sacrificed to it, and said, 'These are your gods, O Israel, who brought you up out of the land of Egypt!" The Lord said to Moses, "I have seen this people, how stiff-necked they are. Now let me alone, so that my wrath may burn hot against them and I may consume them; and of you I will make a great nation." But Moses implored the Lord his God, and said, "O Lord, why does your wrath burn hot against your people, whom you brought out of the land of Egypt with great power and with a mighty hand? Why should the Egyptians say, 'It was with evil intent that he brought them out to kill them in the mountains, and to consume them from the face of the earth'? Turn from your fierce wrath; change your mind and do not bring disaster on your people. Remember Abraham, Isaac, and Israel, your servants, how you swore to them by your own self, saying to them, 'I will multiply your descendants like the stars of heaven, and all this land that I have promised I will give to your descendants, and they shall inherit it forever." And the Lord changed his mind about the disaster that he planned to bring on his people.

Philippians 4:1–9



nce more Jesus spoke to the people in parables, saying: "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a wedding banquet for his son. He sent his slaves to call those who had been invited to the wedding banquet, but they would not come. Again he sent other slaves, saying, 'Tell those who have been invited: Look, I have prepared my dinner, my oxen and my fat calves have been slaughtered, and everything is ready; come to the wedding banquet.' But they made light of it and went away, one to his farm, another to his business, while the rest seized his slaves, mistreated them, and killed them. The king was enraged. He sent his troops, destroyed those murderers, and burned their city. Then he said to his slaves, 'The wedding is ready, but those invited were not worthy. Go therefore into the main streets, and invite everyone you find to the wedding banquet.' 

HVAC project information sessions: Two sessions remain on October 22 at 9:30 a.m. and noon. Because our 30-year-old HVAC (heating/ventilation/air conditioning) system is long past its expected lifespan and not as efficient as it should be, the St. John's House Committee has spent more than a year researching options for installing a new, more efficient system. In addition, an HVAC Financing Committee has been exploring how we might pay for this major project via loans, donations, grants, and financial incentives. Parishioner support for and understanding of this project is vital. We're therefore encouraging all adult parishioners to attend at least one information session on this project. We will host two more sessions, both on October 22, at 9:30 a.m. (during the education hour) and at noon (after the 10:30 service).

**Choral Evensong, Sunday, October 22, 5 p.m.** The next Choral Evensong service features music from our own St. John's Adult Choir and Choir School. Please join us for this ancient and beautiful form of worship that includes chant, music, and prayers.

Stewardship 2023 at St. John's Church

#### What is a pledge?

A pledge is a financial commitment that St. John's asks each person or household to make, to indicate how much money you will give over the coming year to support the church so we have the resources needed to respond to God's call for this community.

Your pledge, combined with pledges from other parishioners and other income sources, constitutes the resources St. John's has available in the coming year to spend on ministries that make a positive impact on people's lives, including worship, music, education programs for all ages, outreach, pastoral care, maintaining our building and grounds, and administration.

#### Why should I pledge?

Pledges benefit both you and St. John's. When you plan ahead for your giving, you make conscious choices about spending your money in ways that reflect your faith and values. You give out of gratitude and joy in being part of this church community, and a desire to support the church's ministries.

Receiving your pledge allows our vestry to set a budget for the year ahead. We don't want to spend more money than we know we have, so we rely on parishioners to state up front how much they will give. Without a clear and realistic budget, we cannot make plans to sustain and grow programs and ministries, which limits the church's ability to meet the needs of the congregation and community.
