Ned Miller Rorem was an American composer of contemporary classical music, and a writer. Best known for his art songs, which number over 500, Rorem was considered the leading American of his time writing in the genre. Frequently described as a neoromantic composer, he showed limited interest in the emerging modernist aesthetic of his lifetime. As a writer, he published numerous diaries in which he spoke candidly of his exchanges and relationships with many cultural figures of America and France.



Philip Radcliffe (1905–1986)



Philip Radcliffe stated: "I attended evensong in the Chapel of my future College (King's College, Cambridge) and can still recall the impact made upon me by the quiet, other-world sound of the choir." He became a music fellow at King's College in 1931, and a lecturer between 1947 and 1972. He lived in King's for the rest of his life, never leaving it for more than a few weeks. Radcliffe's compositions include short choral pieces, liturgical music, songs, and a small number of instrumental works.

In addition, an HVAC Financing Committee has been exploring how we might pay for this major project via loans, donations, grants, and financial incentives. Parishioner support for and understanding of this project is vital. We're therefore encouraging all adult parishioners to attend at least one information session on this project. We will host two sessions today at 9:30 a.m. (during the education hour) and at noon (after the 10:30 service).

Return your completed paper pledge card to the church office, drop it in the collection plate at a Sunday service, or bring your completed card to church on Commitment Sunday: November 12, 2023, when all will be invited to bring their cards forward. We ask that all pledge cards and online pledges be submitted on or before Commitment Sunday, so we can move ahead with the budget process for 2024.

How do I pay my pledge?

You may pay weekly, monthly, quarterly, or annually via cash, check, or electronic fund transfer (EFT), such as through your bank's online bill pay system. You may also pay your pledge online, and set up recurring payments if you wish, at https://siparish.net/give-to-st-johns/ (click on the Give Now! button).

If you expect to pay weekly by check or cash, we can supply you with envelopes dated for each Sunday of the year, which you can use to mail payments or put them in the offering plate. Envelopes are particularly helpful if you plan to pay your pledge in cash, as envelopes are numbered to match them to a particular giver. The pledge card has a check box where you can indicate if you want to receive envelopes.

You may also pay your pledge with a donation of stock; please contact the financial administrator, Peggy O'Toole, **before initiating stock transfer** if you are interested in this option. Many companies have matching funds for charitable donations. If your company has such a plan, please share with us any paperwork we need to complete to get a matching gift.

Please note that for pledge payments/donations to appear on your year-end giving statement that you'll use for your tax return, we need to receive payments in time for them to be processed and posted to our bank account before the end of the year. Pledge payments posted after January 1 will be included on that year's giving statement, even if in payment of the previous year's pledge. For this year, **payments must be received in the parish office or processed online by December 27** for them to appear on your 2023 year-end giving statement.
