Moses George Hogan was an American composer and arranger of choral music. He was awarded a full scholarship to the Oberlin Conservatory of Music, where he studied piano and graduated in 1979 with a bachelor of music degree. Immediately after graduation, he began graduate studies at the Juilliard School of Music, and later studied classical music in Vienna. He is best-known for his settings of spirituals, and his works are celebrated and performed by high school, college, church, community, and professional choirs today. Over his lifetime, he published 88 arrangements for voice, eight of which were solo pieces.




