

ORDER OF SERVICE

Our service begins outside. You may pick up a palm cross when you arrive; however, please wait to pick up a palm frond until we are processing around the church, after the Blessing of the Palms.

THE PALM GOSPEL Matthew 2:1–11

hen Jesus and his disciples had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, 'The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately." This took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet, saying, "Tell the daughter of Zion, Look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey." The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, "Who is this?" The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."


THE PROCESSION

THE PASSION GOSPEL

Mark 15:1-47

All sit. The people speak aloud the lines marked Congregation and stand where indicated, at mention of the place called The Skull.

Narrator As soon as it was morning, the chief priests held a consultation with the elders and scribes

and the whole council. They bound Jesus, led him away, and handed him over to Pilate.

Pilate asked him,

Pilate "Are you the King of the Jews?"

Jesus "You say so."

Narrator Then the chief priests accused him of many things. Pilate asked him again, "Have you no answer? See how many charges they bring against you."

Narrator But Jesus made no further reply, so that Pilate was amazed. Now at the festival he used to

release a prisoner for them, anyone for whom they asked. Now a man called Barabbas was in prison with the rebels who had committed murder during the insurrection. So the crowd came and began to ask Pilate to do for them according to his custom. Then he

answered them,

Pilate "Do you want me to release for you the King of the Jews?"

Narrator For he realized that it was out of jealousy that the chief priests had handed him over. But

the chief priests stirred up the crowd to have him release Barabbas for them instead. Pilate

spoke to them again,

Pilate "Then what do you wish me to do with the man you call the King of the Jews?"

Congregation "Crucify him!"

Pilate "Why, what evil has he done?"

Congregation "Crucify him!"

Narrator So Pilate, wishing to satisfy the crowd, released Barabbas for them; and after flogging

Jesus, he handed him over to be crucified. Then the soldiers led him into the courtyard of the palace (that is, the governor's headquarters); and they called together the whole cohort. And they clothed him in a purple cloak; and after twisting some thorns into a

crown, they put it on him. And they began saluting him,

Crowd/Chief
Priests/Scribes

"Hail, King of the Jews!"

Narrator They struck his head with a reed, spat upon him, and knelt down in homage to him. After

mocking him, they stripped him of the purple cloak and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him out to crucify him. They compelled a passer-by, who was coming in from the country, to carry his cross; it was Simon of Cyrene, the father of Alexander and Rufus. *[Congregation stands.]* Then they brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha (which means the place of a skull). And they offered him wine mixed with myrrh; but he did not take it. And they crucified him, and divided his clothes among them, casting lots to decide what each should take. It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him. The inscription of the charge against him read, "The King of the Jews." And with him they crucified two bandits, one on his right and one on his left. Those who passed by derided

him, shaking their heads and saying,

Passerby 1 "Aha! You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself, and

come down from the cross!"

Narrator In the same way the chief priests, along with the scribes, were also mocking him among

themselves and saying,

Crowd/Chief "He saved others; he cannot save himself. Let the Messiah, the King of Israel, come down

Priests/Scribes from the cross now, so that we may see and believe."

Narrator Those who were crucified with him also taunted him. When it was noon, darkness came

over the whole land until three in the afternoon. At three o'clock Jesus cried out with a

loud voice,

Jesus "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?"

Narrator which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" When some of the

bystanders heard it, they said,

Crowd/Chief "Listen, he is calling for Elijah."

Priests/Scribes

Narrator And someone ran, filled a sponge with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to

drink, saying,

Passerby 2 "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to take him down."

Narrator Then Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last. And the curtain of the temple was torn

in two, from top to bottom. Now when the centurion, who stood facing him, saw that in

this way he breathed his last, he said,

Centurion "Truly this man was God's Son!"

Narrator There were also women looking on from a distance; among them were Mary Magdalene,

and Mary the mother of James the younger and of Joses, and Salome. These used to follow him and provided for him when he was in Galilee; and there were many other women who had come up with him to Jerusalem. When evening had come, and since it was the day of Preparation, that is, the day before the sabbath, Joseph of Arimathea, a respected member of the council, who was also himself waiting expectantly for the kingdom of God, went boldly to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Then Pilate wondered if he were already dead; and summoning the centurion, he asked him whether he had been dead for

some time. When he learned from the centurion that he was dead, he granted the body to Joseph. Then Joseph bought a linen cloth, and taking down the body, wrapped it in the linen cloth, and laid it in a tomb that had been hewn out of the rock. He then rolled a stone against the door of the tomb. Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of Joses saw where the body was laid.

THE SERMON

Dan Forrest's work has become well established in the choral repertoire in the U.S. and around the world, and has received numerous awards and distinctions including the ASCAP Morton Gould Young Composer's Award, the ACDA Raymond Brock Award, the ALCM Raabe Prize, and many others. His choral works have been recorded by professional choirs including Seraphic Fire and VOCES8, have been featured on the BBC Proms series and numerous national US radio and TV broadcasts, and are regularly performed in Carnegie Hall choral

festivals. His Requiem for the Living (2013) has been performed more than 1,000 times around the world. A note from the composer: A Requiem, at its core, is a prayer for rest—traditionally, for the deceased. The five movements of this requiem, however, form a narrative just as much for the living, and their own struggle with pain and sorrow, as for the dead.


THE GREAT THANKSGIVING
