THE WORD OF GOD

THE FIRST LESSON

Acts 8:26–40

All sit.

n angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an lacktriangle Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this: "Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth." The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us. By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. So we have known and believe the love that God has for us. God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. We love because he first loved us. Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.






St. John's Ministry of Healing Prayer

NEWS ABOUT THE MUSIC DIRECTOR SEARCH

Thank you to everyone who participated in last Sunday's wonderful celebration of Scott Lamlein's ministry at St. John's, and all that he, his wife Mary Beth, and son Francis did with and for our faith community over the past nearly 10 years. Please continue to pray for all of them as they undertake this major transition of moving to Atlanta, where Scott will be the new director of music at All Saints' Episcopal Church.

Interim music leadership: We are delighted to welcome **Christopher Houlihan**, organist and director of chapel music at Trinity College, who will be with us through the end of our program year on June 2. Christopher will be leading choir rehearsals and conducting choral anthems in addition to providing organ music for worship.

This summer, the choirs will take a much-deserved break, but we will continue to have an organist at the 10:30 service to accompany hymns and play voluntaries. Among the talented organists who will be here this summer are **Ted Babbitt, Christa Rakich, and Douglas Johnson.** We will also soon be organizing pianists and other musicians to help out at our less formal 9 a.m. outdoor summer services — please contact the parish office if you'd like to help in this way!

In late August, we will welcome **Walden Moore** as our **interim director of music.** Walden is about to retire from Trinity Church, New Haven, where he has served as organist and director of music for 40 years. He has many years of expertise working with choirs of both children and adults, having also served as clinician, guest conductor, and organist for choir festivals across the nation, and we are extremely fortunate that he will be leading our music program during this interim time. Walden's first Sunday at St. John's will be September 8, and he will remain here until a new permanent director of music can begin. During his tenure, he will be at St. John's two to three days a week, including Wednesdays for choir rehearsals and Sundays for worship.

Search committee: With Scott's help and input, we have assembled a search committee that incorporates key constituencies, including adult choir members, choir school parents, the head chorister, current vestry members, former wardens, Red Door board members and staff, and local organ talent with a good understanding of our music ministry at St. John's. The committee will begin meeting soon to plan their next steps.

Please pray for Christopher, Walden, the search committee, potential job candidates, our choirs, our parish leadership, and this entire Christian community of St. John's as we undertake the important work of continuing our tradition of musical excellence while selecting the person who will support, continue, and build upon that tradition into the future.

Almighty God, look graciously on the people of St. John's. Be with us and lead us as we seek our next director of music. We ask your wisdom and guidance for those on the search committee, all who are providing interim leadership, and our choirs.
