 $oldsymbol{\mathcal{T}}$ hen the king was settled in his house, and the Lord had given him rest from all his enemies around him, the king said to the prophet Nathan, "See now, I am living in a house of cedar, but the ark of God stays in a tent." Nathan said to the king, "Go, do all that you have in mind; for the Lord is with you." But that same night the word of the Lord came to Nathan: Go and tell my servant David: Thus says the Lord: Are you the one to build me a house to live in? I have not lived in a house since the day I brought up the people of Israel from Egypt to this day, but I have been moving about in a tent and a tabernacle. Wherever I have moved about among all the people of Israel, did I ever speak a word with any of the tribal leaders of Israel, whom I commanded to shepherd my people Israel, saying, "Why have you not built me a house of cedar?" Now therefore thus you shall say to my servant David: Thus says the Lord of hosts: I took you from the pasture, from following the sheep to be prince over my people Israel; and I have been with you wherever you went, and have cut off all your enemies from before you; and I will make for you a great name, like the name of the great ones of the earth. And I will appoint a place for my people Israel and will plant them, so that they may live in their own place, and be disturbed no more; and evildoers shall afflict them no more, as formerly, from the time that I appointed judges over my people Israel; and I will give you rest from all your enemies. Moreover the Lord declares to you that the Lord will make you a house. When your days are fulfilled and you lie down with your ancestors, I will raise up your offspring after you, who shall come forth from your body, and I will establish his kingdom. He shall build a house for my name, and I will establish the throne of his kingdom forever. I will be a father to him, and he shall be a son to me.

THE SECOND LESSON

Ephesians 2:11–22

Remember that at one time you Gentiles by birth, called "the uncircumcision" by those who are called "the circumcision"—a physical circumcision made in the flesh by human hands—remember that you were at that time without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us. He has abolished the law with its commandments and ordinances, that he might create in himself one new humanity in place of the two, thus making peace, and might reconcile both groups to God in one body through the cross, thus putting to death that hostility through it. So he came and proclaimed peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near; for through him both of us have access in one Spirit to the Father. So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone. In him the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom you also are built together spiritually into a dwelling place for God.



Musicians needed for 9 a.m. Sunday services. Our summer service schedule, which goes through Labor Day weekend, consists of a 9 a.m. service held outdoors in the Cloister Garden (or in Hubbard Hall if it rains), and a 10:30 a.m. service held in the nave and also livestreamed. We are in need of a pianist, guitarist, or other musician to accompany hymns and/or provide preludes and postludes at the 9 a.m. outdoor services on the following dates: August 18, August 25. A new program year begins soon! Mark your calendar for these events: The new program year begins on September 8, with a return to our regular service schedule (Sundays at 8 and 10:30 a.m., and Wednesdays at 5:30 p.m.) and Christian education for all ages. In preparation, we have a few special events planned. The annual Blessing of the Backpacks will happen at both Sunday services (9 a.m. outdoors and 10:30 a.m. indoors) on August 25. Students and educators, of all ages, are invited to bring a backpack, work tote, laptop, or any other school item to be blessed for a new school year. The annual Acolyte Lunch & Training will be on Sunday, September 1, after the 10:30 service. We ask that ALL current acolytes attend if possible along with any youth interested in becoming an acolyte (4th grade and up). Finally, we'll again host a Celebration of Ministry brunch for all adults on Sunday, September 8 at 9:30 a.m. At the same time, children age 3 and up will attend Sunday School in the education wing, and the nursery will be open for infants and toddlers starting at 9 a.m.

Save the date!! Worship service for Todd's installation, Wednesday, September 25 at 7 p.m. As was announced recently, Todd FitzGerald has been called as the next rector of St. John's. Come celebrate with him and our parish community at an installation service with the bishop on September 25.

Updates on St. John's summer staffing:

- Todd FitzGerald, our rector, is on vacation for the month of July in Maine, where he preaches and presides at a summer chapel in Cape Neddick on Sundays. Margie Baker, our associate rector, will be on vacation for most of August, serving at a summer chapel in Longport, NJ, and doing some other travel with her family. To allow both Todd and Margie much-needed time to rest and be with their families, please wait to reach out to them about non-urgent matters until they return to the office (Todd on July 31, Margie on August 28). For urgent or time-sensitive concerns, please contact the clergy person who is not on vacation, and/or Ellen in the parish office.
- Dwight and Ellen also have vacation plans this summer, Peggy continues to take it slow as she recovers from an accident in June, and Margie has another week when she will be working but out of the office (leading the annual Choir School sleepaway camp July 28–August 2). There will be days throughout the summer when the office is closed with no staff available on-site. We suggest calling before stopping by during office hours (9 a.m. to 2 p.m., Monday through Friday), and reaching out as early as possible with any time-sensitive questions or concerns. Thank you!

Please read if you use numbered offering envelopes! Some important tips to ensure that we properly record your gifts

While many people have switched to giving and paying their pledges online, many still prefer to put cash or checks in the offering plate on Sundays. Among those givers, some request numbered envelopes labeled with each Sunday's date to help them keep track of their contributions. To ensure that your contributions are properly attributed, please note the following:

- We only provide numbered offering envelopes to those who request them during each fall's pledge campaign. There is a check-box on both the online and paper pledge forms where you may indicate if you want envelopes. If you do not check the box, you will not receive envelopes for the next year, even if you've used them in the past!
- Please <u>do not use</u> envelopes from a previous year. Make sure that any offering envelopes you put in the plate have THIS year's date on them. Because relatively few parishioners use numbered envelopes and we want to avoid having to purchase far more envelopes than are used, if someone who previously requested envelopes does not request them for the current year, we may re-assign their giving number to someone else. This becomes confusing if you put contributions into offering envelopes with a giving number that is no longer assigned to you!
- The dates on the envelopes are for your convenience, to help you track your giving; the parish office does not use the dates when accounting for your gifts/pledge payments. When we collect each week's offering, we do not record the date on the envelopes we simply remove the checks or cash inside. If the gift is cash, we look at the number on the giving envelope and match it with the person/household to whom that number is assigned, to make sure the cash gift is properly credited. If you miss a few Sundays at church and want to catch up on weekly pledge payments, you do not have to put separate checks and/or cash payments into separate envelopes and then turn in several envelopes at once. For example, if you pledge \$20/week, and you miss church on August 4 and August 11, and then attend on August 18, you may simply put \$60 in the August 18 envelope to catch up on your weekly payments. You do not have to put \$20 in the August 4 envelope, \$20 in the August 11 envelope, and \$20 in the August 18 envelope and put all three envelopes in the offering plate (although you are absolutely welcome to do it that way if it helps with your own tracking!).
- If you did not request envelopes for 2024 but would like them, we can still send some to you! Please just let Ellen in the parish office know that you would like some.

We are so grateful for all of our generous givers and pledgers, and want to be sure that our records accurately reflect your generosity. Again, the key things that you can do to ensure accurate record-keeping are: **Do not use envelopes from a previous year, and request envelopes each fall if you plan to use them in the year to come.** Thank you!
