THE FIRST LESSON 2 Samuel 1:1, 17–27 All sit.

fter the death of Saul, when David had returned from defeating the Amalekites, David remained two days in Ziklag. David intoned this lamentation over Saul and his son Jonathan. (He ordered that The Song of the Bow be taught to the people of Judah; it is written in the Book of Jashar.) He said: Your glory, O Israel, lies slain upon your high places! How the mighty have fallen! Tell it not in Gath, proclaim it not in the streets of Ashkelon; or the daughters of the Philistines will rejoice, the daughters of the uncircumcised will exult. You mountains of Gilboa, let there be no dew or rain upon you, nor bounteous fields! For there the shield of the mighty was defiled, the shield of Saul, anointed with oil no more. From the blood of the slain, from the fat of the mighty, the bow of Jonathan did not turn back, nor the sword of Saul return empty. Saul and Jonathan, beloved and lovely! In life and in death they were not divided; they were swifter than eagles, they were stronger than lions. O daughters of Israel, weep over Saul, who clothed you with crimson, in luxury, who put ornaments of gold on your apparel. How the mighty have fallen in the midst of the battle! Jonathan lies slain upon your high places. I am distressed for you, my brother Jonathan; greatly beloved were you to me; your love to me was wonderful, passing the love of women. How the mighty have fallen, and the weapons of war perished!

THE SECOND LESSON

2 Corinthians 8:7–15

s you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in utmost eagerness, and in our love for you - so we want you to excel also in this generous undertaking. I do not say this as a **L**command, but I am testing the genuineness of your love against the earnestness of others. For you know the generous act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich. And in this matter I am giving my advice: it is appropriate for you who began last year not only to do something but even to desire to do something—now finish doing it, so that your eagerness may be matched by completing it according to your means. For if the eagerness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has—not according to what one does not have. I do not mean that there should be relief for others and pressure on you, but it is a question of a fair balance between your present abundance and their need, so that their abundance may be for your need, in order that there may be a fair balance. As it is written, "The one who had much did not have too much, and the one who had little did not have too little."

Minister The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Mark. All Glory to you, Lord Christ.

hen Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side, a great crowd gathered around him; and he was by the sea. Then one of the leaders of the synagogue named Jairus came and, when he saw him, fell at his feet and begged him repeatedly, "My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well, and live." So he went with him. And a large crowd followed him and pressed in on him. Now there was a woman who had been suffering from hemorrhages for twelve years. She had endured much under many physicians, and had spent all that she had; and she was no better, but rather grew worse. She had heard about Jesus, and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, for she said, "If I but touch his clothes, I will be made well." Immediately her hemorrhage stopped; and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease. Immediately aware that power had gone forth from him, Jesus turned about in the crowd and said, "Who touched my clothes?" And his disciples said to him, "You see the crowd pressing in on you; how can you say, 'Who touched me?'" He looked all around to see who had done it. But the woman, knowing what had happened to her, came in fear and trembling, fell down before him, and told him the whole truth. He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease." While he was still speaking, some people came from the leader's house to say, "Your daughter is dead. Why trouble the teacher any further?" But overhearing what they said, Jesus said to the leader of the synagogue, "Do not fear, only believe." He allowed no one to follow him except Peter, James, and John, the brother of James. When they came to the house of the leader of the synagogue, he saw a commotion, people weeping and wailing loudly. When he had entered, he said to them, "Why do you make a commotion and weep? The child is not dead but sleeping." And they laughed at him. Then he put them all outside, and took the child's father and mother and those who were with him, and went in where the child was. He took her by the hand and said to her, "Talitha cum," which means, "Little girl, get up!" And immediately the girl got up and began to walk about (she was twelve years of age). At this

they were overcome with amazement. He strictly ordered them that no one should know this, and told them to give her something to eat.



Book launch celebration TODAY after the 10:30 service. Margie's new Bible study for teens, titled *God, Gospel & Gender*, was published on June 25 by Church Publishing. Come celebrate with her after the 10:30 service today with refreshments, a few words from Margie, and an opportunity to have your book signed. We will have limited copies for sale at the event (proceeds will go to our local independent bookstore, River Bend Books).

Donate pre-packaged snacks for our Kids Community Music Camp. Our annual Kids Community Music Camp, sponsored by Music at the Red Door and hosted by St. John's, will take place August 19 to 23, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. We already have a full camp roster of 30 children who will spend the week singing, dancing, playing violin, and drumming together with our talented teachers and supportive volunteers. We're asking parishioners to donate prepackaged snacks for the camp week. Due to licensing regulations, we are unable to accept homemade snacks, anything removed from its original packaging, anything in bulk packaging that needs to be opened and divided into smaller servings, or anything that needs to be washed or cut before serving. We need a total of about 300 individually wrapped snacks (two snacks per child per day). If you can help, please drop off the snacks in the parish office or the kitchen with a note or label on them so we know they're intended for the kids' music camp. Or you may order from Amazon and have the snacks delivered to church. Some ideas of snacks that would work well:

- Single-serving packets of goldfish, cheez-its, or other crackers or cookies.
- Individually wrapped granola bars, Rice Krispie bars, or snack bars (without nuts, please).
- Applesauce in single-serving cups or pouches.
- Fruit gummies in single-serving pouches.
- Fruit or veggies in pre-packaged, single-serving pouches, such as apple slices or baby carrots. (If you donate these, please wait to purchase them until the week before camp, and drop them off in the refrigerator.)

Musicians needed for 9 a.m. Sunday services. Our summer service schedule, which goes through Labor Day weekend, consists of a 9 a.m. service held outdoors in the Cloister Garden (or in Hubbard Hall if it rains), and a 10:30 a.m. service held in the nave and also livestreamed. We are in need of a few more pianists, guitarists, or other musicians to accompany hymns and/or provide preludes and postludes at the 9 a.m. outdoor services on the following dates: July 28, August 4, August 18, August 25. Contact Ellen in the parish office if you can help.

Save the date!! Worship service for Todd's installation, Wednesday, September 25 at 7 p.m. As was announced recently, Todd FitzGerald has been called as the next rector of St. John's. Come celebrate with him and our parish community at an installation service with the bishop on September 25.

- Todd FitzGerald, our rector, will be on vacation for the month of July in Maine, where he preaches and presides at a summer chapel in Cape Neddick on Sundays. Margie Baker, our associate rector, will be on vacation for most of August, serving at a summer chapel in Longport, NJ, and doing some other travel with her family. To allow both Todd and Margie much-needed time to rest and be with their families, please wait to reach out to them about non-urgent matters until they return to the office (Todd on August 1, Margie on August 28). For urgent or time-sensitive concerns, please contact the clergy person who is not on vacation, and/or Ellen in the parish office.
- Dwight and Ellen also have vacation plans this summer, and Margie has two weeks when she will be working but out of the office (serving as chaplain at Camp Washington July 15–19, and leading the annual Choir School sleepaway camp July 28–August 2). There will likely be days throughout the summer when the office is closed with no staff available on-site. We suggest calling before stopping by during office hours (9 a.m. to 2 p.m., Monday through Friday), and reaching out as early as possible with any time-sensitive questions or concerns. Thank you!


