THE FIRST LESSON 2 Samuel 11:1–15

TENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

'n the spring of the year, the time when kings go out to battle, David sent Joab with his officers and all Israel with him; they ravaged the Ammonites, and besieged Rabbah. But David remained at lacktriangle Jerusalem. It happened, late one afternoon, when David rose from his couch and was walking about on the roof of the king's house, that he saw from the roof a woman bathing; the woman was very beautiful. David sent someone to inquire about the woman. It was reported, "This is Bathsheba daughter of Eliam, the wife of Uriah the Hittite." So David sent messengers to get her, and she came to him, and he lay with her. (Now she was purifying herself after her period.) Then she returned to her house. The woman conceived; and she sent and told David, "I am pregnant." So David sent word to Joab, "Send me Uriah the Hittite." And Joab sent Uriah to David. When Uriah came to him, David asked how Joab and the people fared, and how the war was going. Then David said to Uriah, "Go down to your house, and wash your feet." Uriah went out of the king's house, and there followed him a present from the king. But Uriah slept at the entrance of the king's house with all the servants of his lord, and did not go down to his house. When they told David, "Uriah did not go down to his house," David said to Uriah, "You have just come from a journey. Why did you not go down to your house?" Uriah said to David, "The ark and Israel and Judah remain in booths; and my lord Joab and the servants of my lord are camping in the open field; shall I then go to my house, to eat and to drink, and to lie with my wife? As you live, and as your soul lives, I will not do such a thing." Then David said to Uriah, "Remain here today also, and tomorrow I will send you back." So Uriah remained in Jerusalem that day. On the next day, David invited him to eat and drink in his presence and made him drunk; and in the evening he went out to lie on his couch with the servants of his lord, but he did not go down to his house. In the morning David wrote a letter to Joab, and sent it by the hand of Uriah. In the letter he wrote, "Set Uriah in the forefront of the hardest fighting, and then draw back from him, so that he may be struck down and die."

esus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world." When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself. When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.





### Please read if you use numbered offering envelopes! Some important tips to ensure that we properly record your gifts

While many people have switched to giving and paying their pledges online, many still prefer to put cash or checks in the offering plate on Sundays. Among those givers, some request numbered envelopes labeled with each Sunday's date to help them keep track of their contributions. To ensure that your contributions are properly attributed, please note the following:

- We only provide numbered offering envelopes to those who request them during each fall's pledge campaign. There is a check-box on both the online and paper pledge forms where you may indicate if you want envelopes. If you do not check the box, you will not receive envelopes for the next year, even if you've used them in the past!
- Please <u>do not use</u> envelopes from a previous year. Make sure that any offering envelopes you put in the plate have THIS year's date on them. Because relatively few parishioners use numbered envelopes and we want to avoid having to purchase far more envelopes than are used, if someone who previously requested envelopes does not request them for the current year, we may re-assign their giving number to someone else. This becomes confusing if you put contributions into offering envelopes with a giving number that is no longer assigned to you!
- The dates on the envelopes are for your convenience, to help you track your giving; the parish office does not use the dates when accounting for your gifts/pledge payments. When we collect each week's offering, we do not record the date on the envelopes we simply remove the checks or cash inside. If the gift is cash, we look at the number on the giving envelope and match it with the person/household to whom that number is assigned, to make sure the cash gift is properly credited. If you miss a few Sundays at church and want to catch up on weekly pledge payments, you do not have to put separate checks and/or cash payments into separate envelopes and then turn in several envelopes at once. For example, if you pledge \$20/week, and you miss church on August 4 and August 11, and then attend on August 18, you may simply put \$60 in the August 18 envelope to catch up on your weekly payments. You do not have to put \$20 in the August 4 envelope, \$20 in the August 11 envelope, and \$20 in the August 18 envelope and put all three envelopes in the offering plate (although you are absolutely welcome to do it that way if it helps with your own tracking!).
- If you did not request envelopes for 2024 but would like them, we can still send some to you! Please just let Ellen in the parish office know that you would like some.

We are so grateful for all of our generous givers and pledgers, and want to be sure that our records accurately reflect your generosity. Again, the key things that you can do to ensure accurate record-keeping are: **Do not use envelopes from a previous year, and request envelopes each fall if you plan to use them in the year to come.** Thank you!

## Get involved with St. John's worship and ministries
