avid slept with his ancestors, and was buried in the city of David. The time that David reigned over Israel was forty years; he reigned seven years in Hebron, and thirty-three years in Jerusalem. So Solomon sat on the throne of his father David; and his kingdom was firmly established. Solomon loved the Lord, walking in the statutes of his father David; only, he sacrificed and offered incense at the high places. The king went to Gibeon to sacrifice there, for that was the principal high place; Solomon used to offer a thousand burnt offerings on that altar. At Gibeon the Lord appeared to Solomon in a dream by night; and God said, "Ask what I should give you." And Solomon said, "You have shown great and steadfast love to your servant my father David, because he walked before you in faithfulness, in righteousness, and in uprightness of heart toward you; and you have kept for him this great and steadfast love, and have given him a son to sit on his throne today. And now, O Lord my God, you have made your servant king in place of my father David, although I am only a little child; I do not know how to go out or come in. And your servant is in the midst of the people whom you have chosen, a great people, so numerous they cannot be numbered or counted. 





Help us stock up for our neighbors in need. We have two ministries for supporting neighbors in need who come to the church looking for help: Blessing Bags are small reusable tote bags given out by our clergy and staff and filled with necessities such as socks, winter accessories, t-shirts, toiletries, snacks, and water. The Blessing Box is a small self-service food pantry located in the Abraham's Welcome garden area on the Farmington Avenue side of the church property. We encourage parishioners to put nonperishable food (especially ready-to-eat items) directly into the Blessing Box as often as you can, but we also keep some food on hand in the office for days when the Blessing Box is empty and someone stops by looking for something to eat. As fall approaches, we'd like to stock up on items for these two ministries. We have an Amazon wish list, from which you can order and have items directly shipped to the church. Go to siparish.net/blessing bags. Or you may purchase similar items at your preferred retailer and drop them at the church office any time. Thank you!

A new program year begins soon! Mark your calendar for these events: The new program year begins on September 8, with a return to our regular service schedule (Sundays at 8 and 10:30 a.m., and Wednesdays at 5:30 p.m.) and Christian education for all ages. In preparation, we have a few special events planned:

- The annual **Blessing of the Backpacks will happen at both Sunday services (9 a.m. outdoors and 10:30 a.m. indoors) on August 25**. Students and educators, of all ages, are invited to bring a backpack, work tote, laptop, or any other school item to be blessed for a new school year.
- The annual **Acolyte Lunch & Training will be on Sunday, September 1, after the 10:30 service.** We ask that ALL current acolytes attend if possible along with any youth interested in becoming an acolyte (3<sup>rd</sup> grade and up).
- Finally, we'll again host a **Celebration of Ministry brunch for all adults on Sunday, September 8 at 9:30 a.m.** At the same time, children age 3 and up will attend Sunday School in the education wing, and the nursery will be open for infants and toddlers starting at 9 a.m.

Please wait to reach out to her about non-urgent matters until she returns to the office on August 28. For urgent or time-sensitive concerns, please contact Todd and/or Ellen in the parish office. As other staff members take occasional time off for the remainder of the summer, there will be days when the office is closed with no staff available on-site. **We suggest calling before stopping by during office hours (9 a.m. to 2 p.m., Monday through Friday), and reaching out as early as possible with any time-sensitive questions or concerns. #### GRACE CHURCH FOOD PANTRY



About once a month, a parish volunteer delivers nonperishable food donations to the Grace Episcopal Church food pantry in the Parkville neighborhood of Hartford.

Bring donated food to church and leave it in the wagon in the narthex. Items needed: Shelf-stable milk, pasta and sauce, mac and cheese, peanut butter, jelly, cereal, rice, canned vegetables and fruit, applesauce, canned soup and pasta.
