

THE WORD OF GOD

THE FIRST LESSON

All sit.

Esther 7:1–6, 9–10; 9:20–22

The king and Haman went in to feast with Queen Esther. On the second day, as they were drinking wine, the king again said to Esther, "What is your petition, Queen Esther? It shall be granted you. And what is your request? Even to the half of my kingdom, it shall be fulfilled." Then Queen Esther answered, "If I have won your favor, O king, and if it pleases the king, let my life be given me—that is my petition—and the lives of my people—that is my request. For we have been sold, I and my people, to be destroyed, to be killed, and to be annihilated. If we had been sold merely as slaves, men and women, I would have held my peace; but no enemy can compensate for this damage to the king." Then King Ahasuerus said to Queen Esther, "Who is he, and where is he, who has presumed to do this?" Esther said, "A foe and enemy, this wicked Haman!" Then Haman was terrified before the king and the queen. Then Harbona, one of the eunuchs in attendance on the king, said, "Look, the very gallows that Haman has prepared for Mordecai, whose word saved the king, stands at Haman's house, fifty cubits high." And the king said, "Hang him on that." So they hanged Haman on the gallows that he had prepared for Mordecai. Then the anger of the king abated. Mordecai recorded these things, and sent


letters to all the Jews who were in all the provinces of King Ahasuerus, both near and far, enjoining them that they should keep the fourteenth day of the month Adar and also the fifteenth day of the same month, year by year, as the days on which the Jews gained relief from their enemies, and as the month that had been turned for them from sorrow into gladness and from mourning into a holiday; that they should make them days of feasting and gladness, days for sending gifts of food to one another and presents to the poor.

THE GOSPEL

MinisterThe Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Mark.AllGlory to you, Lord Christ.

John said to Jesus, "Teacher, we saw someone casting out demons in your name, and we tried to stop him, because he was not following us." But Jesus said, "Do not stop him; for no one who does a deed of power in my name will be able soon afterward to speak evil of me. Whoever is not against us is for us. For truly I tell you, whoever gives you a cup of water to drink because you bear the name of Christ will by no means lose the reward. If any of you put a stumbling block before one of these little ones who believe in me, it would be better for you if a great millstone were hung around your neck and you were thrown into the sea. If your hand causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life maimed than to have two hands and to go to hell, to the unquenchable fire. And if your foot causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life lame than to have two feet and to be thrown into hell. Leo Sowerby began to compose at the age of 10, and to teach himself organ at the age of 15. He studied and taught at the American Conservatory of Music; received the 1946 Pulitzer Prize for Music for his cantata, the Canticle of the Sun; and was the first composer to receive the Rome Prize from the American Academy. His substantial output includes more than 500 works in every genre but opera and ballet. After his retirement as organist and choirmaster from St. James Episcopal Cathedral in Chicago, he was called to Washington National Cathedral to

become the founding director of the College of Church Musicians, a position he held until his death.





THE VOLUNTARY Prélude-Toccata, op. 29, no. 1

Gabriel Pièrne (1863–1937)



French composer and organist Gabriel Pierné studied at the Paris Conservatoire, gaining first prizes for solfège, piano, organ, counterpoint, and fugue. He won the French Prix de Rome in 1882, with his cantata Edith. His teachers included César Franck (for the organ) and Jules Massenet (for composition). He succeeded César Franck as organist at Sainte-Clotilde Basilica in Paris from 1890 to 1898. A member of the Académie des Beaux Arts in 1924, Pierné gave first performances of most of the major works of his contemporaries: Saint-Saëns,

Debussy, Roussel, Ravel, Schmitt, Enesco, and Stravinsky. An eminent conductor and dedicated composer, Pierné wrote in almost all genres.


Sign up for a cottage meeting, held at various times and places from October 1 to October 13. St. John's is holding a series of "cottage meetings" during the first two weeks of October in preparation for our upcoming capital campaign. Some meetings will be held in parishioners' homes while others are at church. All parishioners are invited to come discuss what you love about St. John's, and dream together about what God is calling this community to be and do. Each gathering will be about an hour and a half. Light refreshments will be served. Go to **sjparish.net/cottagemeetings** to sign up for your preferred day and time. Attendance at each meeting is limited, so if your first choice is full, find another one that works for your schedule. If you need help with the online sign-up, call Ellen in the parish office (860-523-5201) and she will sign you up for your preferred time.

Help us stock up for our neighbors in need. We have two ministries for supporting neighbors in need who come to the church looking for help: **Blessing Bags** are small reusable tote bags given out by our clergy and staff and filled with necessities such as socks, winter accessories, t-shirts, toiletries, snacks, and water. The **Blessing Box** is a small self-service food pantry located in the Abraham's Welcome garden area on the Farmington Avenue side of the church property. We encourage parishioners to put nonperishable food (especially ready-to-eat items) directly into the Blessing Box as often as you can, but we also keep some food on hand in the office for days when the Blessing Box is empty and someone stops by looking for something to eat. As fall approaches, we'd like to stock up on items for these two ministries. We have an Amazon wish list, from which you can order and have items directly shipped to the church. Go to sjparish.net/blessingbags. Or you may purchase similar items at your preferred retailer and drop them at the church office any time. Thank you!

Looking for an easy and rewarding volunteer role at St. John's? Try our flower ministry! Each Sunday, we have two beautiful flower arrangements on the high altar. So that the flowers won't go to waste, we're looking for someone (or a few people!) to retrieve the flowers after each week's 10:30 service, divide the arrangements into smaller bouquets (which can be wrapped in florist foil or put in a spare vase), and give them to parishioners to take home. The flowers can go to those listed in the bulletin as having a birthday or anniversary, to a newcomer or friend, or dropped off to one of our members who is homebound. This is an easy job that helps spread joy and also ensure that we're not wasting resources.
