



The Rev. Benjamin Straley is rector of St. Stephen's Church in Providence, and is also a noted concert organist who performed here in 2020. He previously served as organist and associate director of music at Washington National Cathedral, and prior to his appointment, was organ xcholar at Trinity Church, New Haven as well as director of music for the Episcopal Church at Yale. He completed his undergraduate studies with Marilyn Keiser at Indiana University, and entered the Yale Institute of Sacred Music in 2008. In 2010,

he became one of the few Americans in the history of the Haarlem Organ Festival to compete in its world-renowned improvisation contest. He holds master's degrees in both music and divinity from Yale, as well as a certificate in Anglican studies from Berkeley Divinity School.

Stronger Families/Stronger Futures project to support families at Christmas: Donations due by next Sunday, December 8. This annual project to help parents/caregivers in the Stronger Families/Stronger Futures project purchase gifts and food for their family Christmas celebrations is underway. The process is slightly different than the past few years, and there are several ways to participate. You may select a child's tag from our mini Christmas tree in Hubbard Hall, and commit to providing that child's family with a \$100 gift card and children's book by our deadline, OR you may donate money with which we will purchase gift cards (cash or check written to St. John's), OR you may donate a children's or YA book. Gift cards can be handed directly to a volunteer who is staffing the project table on Sunday mornings, or delivered to the office during the week.

Help us prepare for another successful Christmas Festival. The annual Christmas Festival fundraiser is coming up on Saturday, December 7. Please help out in one or more of the following ways:


A few notes on pledging and online pledge payments:

• If you haven't yet submitted a pledge for 2025, you may do so in several ways: Blank pledge cards and envelopes are available at either entrance to the church, and can be mailed or placed in the offering plate. You may pledge online at siparish.net/pledge or via your online Realm account. The sooner you submit your 2025 pledge, the easier it will be for the vestry to pass a realistic budget before the end of the year.

• If you pay your pledge via recurring online gifts set up in Realm, please make sure to login to switch the target fund from the 2024 Annual Pledge Fund to the 2025 Annual Pledge Fund once your 2024 pledge is fully paid and you want your recurring gifts to be applied to 2025.

Year-end giving deadline is December 26. In order for your pledge payments and contributions to appear on your 2024 giving statement, they must be received in the parish office or online no later than December 26. This allows several days for contributions to be deposited and posted before the end of the year. Contributions received after that date may not appear on your 2024 statement, even if in payment of a 2024 pledge. Thank you!

Women Together to begin a new book discussion on December 3. Women Together is a group that gathers weekly to explore our Christian faith and practice through book discussion, prayer, and fellowship. We meet on Tuesdays from 2 to 3:15 p.m. in St. John's Reception Room. On December 3, we will begin discussing *In the Bleak Midwinter through Advent and Christmas* by Rachel Mann (2019), which explores Advent and Christmas through the poetry of Christina Rossetti, whose work was made into favorite carols, including *In the bleak midwinter* and *Love came down at Christmas*. If you haven't read the book, you are welcome to come and join the discussion anyway. The books we choose are usually available at libraries and from Amazon and other booksellers.
