Still active as a conductor, composer, clinician, lecture,r and adjudicator, he has also held guest professorships in conducting at Wayne State University in Detroit, the University of Texas in Austin, and the University of South Africa in Pretoria.





Harold Friedell was well-known as an organist and educator, serving as a teacher at Juilliard and Union Seminary, a composer of choral anthems and solo organ pieces, and a prominent leader in the American Guild of Organists. He was appointed as organist and choirmaster at New York's Calvary Church in 1939, and then moved to the same position at St. Bartholomew's Church in 1946, where he remained until the end of his career.

Jazz Eucharist, Sunday, January 19 at 10:30 a.m. Next Sunday we will welcome the Hot Cat Jazz Band, a local band specializing in jazz worship music, to the 10:30 service. This annual tradition will feature such favorite hymns as *Shall we gather at the river, This little light of mine,* and *When the saints go marching in,* along with jazz prelude and postlude.

Looking for a simple but important and rewarding volunteer role? We need volunteers each Sunday to remove the altar flowers from their urns after the 10:30 service, divide them into smaller bouquets (for which we supply florist foil and vases), and give them away to someone at coffee hour (a friend, a newcomer, someone whose birthday or anniversary is listed in the bulletin) or deliver them to one of our homebound parishioners on your way home. Ideally, we'd like two to four volunteers who can take turns and coordinate with one another to be sure each Sunday is covered during the program year (September to early June — we don't have altar flowers over the summer). This job only takes a few minutes but is a huge help to our Altar Guild and ensures that the altar flowers don't go to waste. Contact Ellen in the parish office if you can help.

Annual Meeting, Sunday, January 26 from 9 to 10:15 a.m. All parish adults and youth age 16 and older are encouraged to attend the parish annual meeting on January 26, where we will elect new vestry members, review the year just past, and look ahead to the new year. A potluck continental breakfast will be served—sign up to bring something at sjparish.net/annualmeeting. The meeting will end in time for the 10:30 worship service, and after the service, we will host a special dessert coffee hour in honor of Walden Moore's last Sunday as our interim music director.

Since returning, John and Virginia have both been active members of the parish, with John previously serving on the vestry and as stewardship chair and currently serving as finance committee chair, and Virginia

having served as warden (among other roles). Professionally, John has been in the insurance industry for the past 15 years and is currently head of corporate development for Everest Group. Prior to working in insurance, John was a partner with McKinsey & Co. in New York. While in New York, John and his family were members of St. Bartholomew's Church. Kimberley Byrd (three-year term) — Kim and her family have been active members of St. John's for more than 30 years and live in West Hartford. 
