

and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." Calvin Hampton (1938–1984)



(George) Calvin Hampton was a leading American organist and sacred music composer. From 1963 to 1983, Hampton was organist and choirmaster at Calvary Episcopal Church in Manhattan. His Fridays at Midnight organ recital series, which ran from 1974 to 1983, was among the most well-known and popular organ recital series in American history, where he permitted the audience to sit next to the console, collected donations in an organ pipe, and served warm apple cider. Before Hampton's death, Erik Routley, an authority on church music, called Hampton "the greatest living composer of hymn tunes."





# Important notes about our parish database and online directory!

A popular feature of Realm, our membership database software, is an online parish directory available to parish members and staff with login credentials. To make this tool as useful, accurate, and secure as possible, please note the following:



- Next Friday 1/24/25, the parish office will make a global privacy change to
  ensure that all members are included in the online directory. When we make this change, members with
  a valid email on file in Realm will receive notice of it.
- This privacy change does NOT mean that your personal information has been compromised! Members' contact information is ONLY available to other parish members and staff who have login credentials for Realm. Your information on Realm is NOT accessible to non-members, to anyone without login credentials, or in any publicly available way. The parish office only allows known church members to access Realm.
- If you want to OPT OUT of having your information in the online parish directory, contact Ellen in the parish office by 9 a.m. on Friday, January 24. If you do not opt out, your contact information (address, phone, email) and photo (if you have one uploaded on Realm) will be visible in the online directory.
- Your confidential pledge and contribution information is never visible to other parish members. This information is only visible to you and certain staff members with financial oversight responsibilities.
- To use the online directory and other Realm features, login to Realm at onrealm.org/sjparish OR download the Realm Connect app on your smartphone and login via the app. The directory is a menu option on both the web site and the app. In Realm, you can also make and track your pledge, set up one-time or recurring pledge payments, access your giving history, upload a profile photo, and register and pay for events.
- If you do not have Realm login credentials, go to onrealm.org/sjparish and click to request login access. The parish office will review all login access requests the next business day, and will only approve access for known parish members. Once you are approved, you will receive an email inviting you to set up login credentials.
- Please login to check your contact information and update your photo in Realm annually, to make sure that we have the most current information on file for you.
- If you're new and we don't yet have your information in Realm, fill out our online newcomer form at siparish.net/newcomer. We will create a record for you in Realm and send you instructions for setting up your login credentials.


# **Eleanor Barnes (nominated for her second one-year term)**
